Due to its isolated but prominent coastal site, the LaVallette house is a local landmark in Crisfield, especially for area watermen ^{who} ~~with~~ sight the chimneys of the house for their bearings. The single-story Queen Anne style frame house is covered by a combination of hip and gabled roof shapes. The walls are currently sheathed with aluminum except for the gables which retain fishscale shingles and stick decoration.

Albert T. LaVallette, Junior, is documented in the biographical record of the Eastern Shore as a turn of the century dealer in seafood from Chesapeake Bay and Tangier Sound. Evidently, he was known especially for hatching and raising diamond back terrapins for East Coast markets. His house, named Ruth-Elie for his two children, was erected on a point southeast of nearby ~~of~~ Crisfield.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The LaValette House stands at the end of LaValette Road which intersects Norris Harbor Drive on the south~~east~~ side of Crisfield, Somerset County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half Victorian house faces west, while the principal roof ridges are oriented on an east/west axis.

The irregular plan frame house is supported by a continuous brick foundation and is sheathed with a combination of aluminum siding and fishscale shingles. The main block is covered by a complex series of wood shingle roofs with extended eaves. Attached to the back of the house is a modern bedroom wing.

The west (main) elevation is an uneven facade with a projecting centrally located bay with flanking porches. The main entrance is situated on the south porch wall, and the door is a heavily molded four-panel design. The porch roof is distinguished by a decorative balustrade with urn finials. The projecting bay immediately north of the entrance is covered by a gable-front roof and has a second floor balcony that is reached through double doors on the second floor. Protruding through the roof on the north side of the main block is a paneled brick chimney with a corbelled cap. A shed dormer marks the west slope of the main gable roof.

The north and south gable ends of the main house are essentially alike with paired or single 1/1 sash windows lighting the first and second floors. The upper gable of both sides retains its fishscale shingles. The peak of the roof is embellished with simple stick decoration.

Extending from the east wall of the main house is a gable roofed kitchen wing finished in the same manner as the main house. Narrow brick chimneys rise in two locations from the south side. The rear is covered by a Gothic cap, and the gable end is finished with the same stick style decoration.

The irregular plan has a stair hall in the front southwest corner. The stair, however, has been largely stripped of its woodwork. Portions of the Victorian period newel post design and baluster profiles remain on the second floor. The front room or parlor has the most elaborate mantel with a corner hearth location with an arched opening. A shell carving is found in the center under the simply molded mantel shelf which is flanked by paneled spandrels. The arched hearth opening is filled with a cast iron coal stove.

Four-panel doors open into the adjacent rooms. The door surrounds are symmetrically molded with bulls-eye corner blocks. The high baseboard has an ogee top molding. A mantel in the dining room (behind the parlor) has a molded surround, a plain frieze, and a dented bed molding to the mantel shelf. Piercing the wall directly north of the mantel is a four-panel door which opens into the enclosed porch.

The balance of first floor rooms are simply finished with modern materials or left alone with undistinguished late nineteenth-century woodwork.

The LaValette house is a local landmark in Crisfield for area waterman as well as residents. Waterman are known to sight the chimneys for their orientation off shore from Crisfield. Unfortunately the exterior of the house has been compromised with the application of aluminum siding. Some period details such as the fishscale shingles and stick style ornamentation in the peaks have been left in place. The interior has been altered as well with the removal of the stair balustrade. Period woodwork for two rooms as well as several doors remain intact.



The second floor is an undivided space over the main block. A small door opens into the partially converted bathroom over the kitchen wing.

Behind the house is a small weatherboard frame storage building covered with a medium sloped roof. The structure is held together with wire nails. In the field near this building is one of the last terrapin holding pens made of vertical wood panels driven into the marsh.
