"Glanville's Lot" is a highly significant site of an early eighteenth-century brick plantation house that survived until the early twentieth century when it burned. Photographs suggest the early house, following a hall/parlor plan, dated from the first half of the eighteenth century. Documented in the historic images of the dwelling are twelve-over-twelve sash windows that flanked a centrally positioned door. Three gabled dormers lighted the second floor rooms. The Civil War era addition fully covered the gable end of the old brick house. Built on a raised brick foundation, the two-story weatherboarded house was lighted by large-size six-over-six sash windows and trimmed with eave brackets.

"Glanville's Lot" was surveyed initially on March 11, 1663, for William Glanville. The 500-acre tract appears also in reference to the establishment of ports and towns for the advancement of trade in Maryland. Along with Rehobeth, Snow Hill, and Green Hill, an additional site was considered, "...on a point of Land lying in the fork of Manokin River where Captan Henry Smith formerly lived sometimes called White House." By 1740 records indicate Captain John Tunstall was living on the plantation formerly occupied by Captain Henry Smith, and that Tunstall was operating a shipyard on the site. Also, at the same time, a court appointed commission was established to determine the boundaries of "Glanville's Lot" for Reverend James Robertson, an early Episcopal minister who was later buried on the property. His expensive, imported brownstone table marker was relocated to the Coventry Parish churchyard at Rehobeth.

## Glanville's Lot Description

The property historically known as "Glanville's Lot" is located on the south side of the Manokin River and north of Kings Creek. Forming a small peninsula known as Stewart Neck, the two bodies of water border the property to the west and south. Princess Anne is located approximately 2.5 miles northeast of the site.

Formerly located on this prominent river site was a combination eighteenth and nineteenth century house that burned during the early twentieth century. Part of the mid nineteenth-century section was reused in the construction of an early twentieth-century bungalow, which was subsequently reworked into a Williamsburg imitation of a mid eighteenth century house, which remains on the property at this time.

Historic photographs of the former dwelling indicate the early brick dwelling evidently dated from the second quarter of the eighteenth century. The story-and-a-half, three-bay by one room brick house was converted to a service wing during the second half of the nineteenth century. The photograph records twelve-over-twelve sash windows that flanked a centrally positioned door, and three dormers lighted the loft. Added around the turn of the century was a single-story turned post porch with decorative corner brackets.

The nineteenth-century addition fully covered the north gable end of the brick house. Built on a raised brick foundation, the two-story weatherboarded house was lighted by large-size six-over-six sash windows and trimmed with eave brackets. Attached to the water side of the frame house was a wraparound Victorian porch.


### Significance

"Glanville's Lot" is a highly significant site of an early eighteenth-century brick plantation house that survived destruction until the early twentieth century. Photographs suggest it was probably a hall-parlor plan dwelling dating from 1725-1750. The two-story, two-bay frame addition was evidently attached around the time of the Civil War.

"Glanville's Lot" was surveyed initially on March 11, 1663, for William Glanville. The 500-acre tract appears next in reference to the establishment of ports and town for the advancement of trade in Maryland. Along with Rehoboth, Snow Hill, Green Hill, an additional site was considered, "on a point of Land lying in the fork of Manokin River where Captain Henry Smith formerly lived sometimes called White House." (Torrence, p. 422). By 1740 records indicate that Captain John Tunstall was living on the plantation formerly occupied by Captain Henry Smith, and that he was operating a "shipyard". (Torrence, p.423). At that time a court appointed commission was established to determine the boundaries of "Glanville's Lot" for Reverend James Robertson, who was buried on the property. His brownstone table marker was relocated to the cemetery at Coventry Parish Church.
