The Stadler bungalow, historically identified as the Gregor W. Gill house, is a story-and-a-half frame dwelling that formerly stood in the small village community of Manokin, previously known as "Jamestown." Dating around 1910, the four-room plan frame dwelling was designed in the bungalow style. The principal features of the house that speak of this nationally popular architectural form include the story-and-a-half elevation, a broad hip roof, exposed rafter feet, and the large hip roofed dormer that lights the second floor. Other more generic architectural elements typical of the early twentieth century include two-over-two sash windows and the five-panel exterior and interior doors.

The research available on this house and its former lot location indicate the house was erected after a 1907 transfer from J. Thomas and Mary F. Dorsey, et al. to Gregor W. Gill for \$400. The lot, bounded by the main Fairmount peninsula road and the road connecting Revell's Neck and the Annemessex River, was identified in the 1907 deed as being in the community of "Jamestown," the former name of the village now called Manokin. In 1927, the house and lot were sold by H. Fillmore Lankford, assignee, to Winter W. and Edna W. Beauchamp, under whose name the property remained until 1963. Since the mid 1960s the property was held by the

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Mariner family until Barbara M. Stadler purchased the house and moved it in 1994 to its present location in the periphery of Upper Hill.

The Stadler bungalow stands on a narrow wedge shaped lot bounded on the north by Jones Factory Road and on the south by MD Route 361 in the vicinity of Upper Fairmount, Somerset County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half frame house faces west with the hip roof oriented on an east/west axis. Built around 1910-20, the story-and-a-half dwelling was moved to this site from the nearby village of Manokin, Maryland.

Supported on a new brick veneered, concrete block foundation, the squarish frame house is sheathed with plain weatherboards and it is covered by a steeply pitched, asphalt shingle hip roof which has extended eaves and exposed rafter ends.

The west (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with a recessed entrance sheltered by an engaged porch. A five-panel front door, protected by the porch, is flanked on the left by a two-over-two sash window. To the right is another two-over-two sash window. All three openings are framed by plain surrounds. The west slope of the roof is dominated by a large hip roofed dormer sheathed with wood shingles on each side. The front dormer wall is pierced by five small windows filled with two-over-two sash windows.

The south side of the house is defined by a pair of symmetrically balanced two-over-two sash windows. The north side, on the other hand, is marked by a single two-over-two sash.

Marking the east (rear) wall is a five-panel door flanked by two-over-two sash windows to each side. The upper gable is an uninterrupted wall of plain weatherboards, resheathed after the move since the hip roof was temporarily removed for the purpose of relocation.

The interior is divided into four principal rooms on the first floor. The rear two rooms are separated by an enclosed stair. The southeast room, the kitchen, features beaded board wainscoting and a built-in cupboard dating to the early twentieth century. The second floor was never partitioned or finished, and it remains one large space.


