The Nellie Perry house stands at 8125 Upper Hill Road in the historic black community of Upper Hill, Somerset County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story cross gabled frame house faces west with the principal gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Estimated to date to 1890-1900, this house was moved to this site around 1946 by the current owner, Nellie Perry, who now resides in a manufactured home next door. The house is occupied by seasonal tenants during the summer. Supported on a low masonry foundation, the single-pile frame house is sheathed with asbestos shingles, and the steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a single-story kitchen wing.

The west (main) facade is a three-bay elevation with a center entrance filled with a partially glazed front door. The adjacent two-over-two sash windows and the entrance are sheltered by a cross gabled front porch supported by turned posts and embellished with decorative corner brackets. The second floor is marked by three evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows, and the cross gable is pierced by a pointed arch window. The first and second floor windows retain shutter hardware, but no longer survive with the shutters themselves. The eaves to the cross gabled roof are extended and the soffits are boxed. Rising through the roof is an off-center single-flue stove chimney.

The north and south gable ends are largely alike with single two-over-two sash windows on each floor, and a pointed arch window marks the upper gable end. The gable end eaves are extended and the soffits are boxed.

Extending from the east side of the main block is a single-story kitchen wing extended on the south side by a shed addition. The south wall of the shed room is marked by a side entrance and a bank of single-pane sash windows.

The interior was not seen.






