Historically identified as the James J. Brittingham house, this two-and-a-half story cross gabled frame dwelling is estimated to date around 1920 and reflects the continued use of this traditional vernacular house form well into the twentieth century. A concrete block foundation supports the single-pile frame dwelling along with a two-story kitchen wing to the rear. Single-pane sash windows light the first and second floors, and a continuous boxed cornice with extended eaves trims the perimeter of the roof.

The house stands on the western side of the community of Freemantown, a historic black village that borders the eastern edge of Crisfield. The land on which this house was built belonged to Sabra Brittingham during the late nineteenth century and first decades of the twentieth century. Prior to her death in 1919 the lot was unimproved. Due to the architectural details of the house, it is estimated that construction took place shortly following her death. The property remained in Brittingham family hands until 1941.

The James J. Brittingham house is 26580 Main Street Extended in the historic black community of Freemantown, in the vicinity of Crisfield, Somerset County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, three-bay frame house faces south with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Estimated to date around 1920, this two-and-a-half story, three-bay, center hall/single-pile frame house is supported on a low concrete block foundation, and the exterior is clad with asbestos shingles. The steeply pitched gable roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles. Extending to the north (rear) is a two-story, two-bay by one-room service wing.

The south (main) facade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a center entrance sheltered by a single-bay gable roofed stoop. The door is partially glazed. Flanking the entrance bay are single-pane sash windows. The second floor is lighted by three evenly spaced single-pane sash windows, and a centered cross gable is pierced by a small four-pane window. The perimeter of the roof is finished with a boxed cornice. A narrow brick chimney stack protrudes through the roof flanking the center hall.

Each gable end is marked by a single one-over-one sash window on each floor. The gable end of the roof is finished with an extended eave and short returns are found at the base.

The two-story, one-room plan kitchen wing extends southward to form a tee-plan for the entire house. Single-pane sash windows light the first and second floors, and an interior end brick chimney protrudes through the gable end.

The interior was not seen.






