The Robert L. Lacey House is significant as an example of modest mid-nineteenth century rural architecture. This one-and-a-half story structure has a center hall, single pile plan. Although the exterior is now sheathed with artificial siding, its original weatherboard siding survives underneath the modern sheathing. Few of its original interior finishes have survived. The late nineteenth century tobacco barn and upright sword prize located on the property are also of interest.

This house was probably built by a tenant of either Richard P. Blakistone or Colonel John F. Dent. Robert L. Lacey purchased 108.84 acres of Dent's portion of "Hayden's Fair" and "Phil Key's Land" in 1888 which he farmed until his death in 1905. Under Rose E. Hill's ownership, the one-story addition and shed roof dormers were added to the house.

The Robert L. Lacey House is located at the end of a dirt road on the west side of the Chaptico-Hurry Road between Hurry and Chaptico in St. Mary's County, Maryland. Three small gable roofed outbuildings stand to the south of the structure and one tobacco barn stands to the north of the house. Cultivated fields extend on all sides of the building. The house faces east with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Constructed around 1850, the house is comprised of a one-and-a-half story, three-bay main block with a one-story, two-bay addition on the southern end. The house is sheathed with asbestos shingle and vinyl siding. The roof is covered with corrugated metal. Underneath the house, the floor joists are skinned logs which rest on stone piers.

The east elevation is sheltered by a shed roof porch with a metal roof supported by turned posts. The porch ceiling has been removed, but the wood porch floor survives. Above the old ceiling level, the house's original weatherboard siding attached with mature machine cut nails is visible. The facade of the house is pierced by a central partially glazed entrance door flanked by one two-over-two sash window on the north side and one two-over-six sash window with paneled shutters. Two shed roof dormers lit by six-over-six sash windows light the house's upper half story. These dormers were added in the early twentieth century. The southern addition is pierced by a partially glazed entrance door and one two-over-two sash window with a paneled shutter.

The south elevation of the main block is largely obscured by the one-story, southern addition. An exterior brick chimney stands against this flush gable end, and a window opening lights the eave to the west of the chimney. The addition is lit by a bank of two-over-two sash windows with wide, flat surrounds. A shed roof addition sheathed with German siding extends to the west of the earlier southern wing. This addition is pierced by a four-light-over-three-panel door with narrow surrounds.

The west elevation of the southern addition is pierced by two window openings. The north side of the addition is pierced by one six-over-six sash window. The main block of the house is finished with a boxed cornice and pierced by two window openings, one of which was a six-over-six sash window and one of which was a two-over-two sash window.

The north elevation of the main block is blind except for a window opening at

7.1 Description

the upper half story which has been boarded over. An exterior brick chimney stands against this flush gable end which is sheathed with asbestos shingle siding and finished with a plain eave board.

The interior plan of the house consists of a center hall flanked on either side by a parlor accessible behind a four-panel door with a plain, beaded surround. Mantels survive in both parlors. These mantels consist of fluted pilasters which end in a scrolling bracket which supports the mantel shelf. Underneath the mantel shelf is a strip of scalloped edging. At the end of the central entrance hall is an enclosed winder stair leading to the upper half story of the house. A vertical panel door opens to a small closet under the stair. The interior walls of the winder stair are sheathed with board and batten siding. The upper half story of the house consists of two rooms which retain none of their original finishes.

All three outbuildings on the property are gable roof structures facing north with their roof on a north/south axis. These structures stand on the south side of the house and are in poor repair. One of these is sheathed with weatherboard siding and roofed with corrugated metal. A second outbuilding is sheathed with tar paper over vertical siding and roofed with metal. The third outbuilding, located closest to the house, is sheathed with plywood and weatherboard siding and roofed with metal. A F. E. Myers and Bro. Co. hand pump, made in Shland, Ohio, stands on the southeast side of the house.

A tobacco barn dating to the late nineteenth century is located about 500 feet north of the house. The barn is rectangular in form, measuring 20 feet by 60 feet with a 16 foot shed on the south side. The barn's gable roof is oriented on an east/west axis. This structure is sheathed with vertical board siding and roofed with metal.

The organizational plan of the barn consists of an 8 foot bay system with 4 foot rooms. Two six-room sections of the barn are separated by a central aisle. A double door entrance which opens onto this aisle is the principal opening on the barn's north side. The shed is almost completely open on the south elevation, although the southwestern corner of the barn is partially enclosed. An upright tobacco prize is located in this southwest corner of the barn's shed.

The structural system of the barn consists of circular sawn ground sills which rest on stone piers. The sills are mortise and tenoned together and reinforced with wooden pegs. The framing system consists of principal posts on four foot centers with supports on two foot centers. The corner posts are reinforced with down braces. The roof is a common rafter roof on four foot centers. The system used to hang tobacco consists of horizontal rails which have been nailed to the interior face of the four walls

of the barn. In addition, intermediate tier pole supports run longitudinally down the center of the barn. At each tier pole level, one tier pole extends horizontally from the northern wall of the barn in a transverse row across the interior space through a hole in the intermediate vertical support and across to the barn's southern wall. These tier poles provide support for the sticks of tobacco.

The shed on the barn's south elevation is organized on roughly the same bay system as the structure's main block. The shed is supported by a series of vertical posts which rest on concrete blocks. The south side of the shed is largely open as the vertical siding extends only about a quarter of the way down the elevation.






