Part Massum Eyrie is significant as an example of mid-nineteenth-century architecture in St. Mary's County. The exterior of the house has been considerably altered over the years with modern replacement materials, but some original interior finishes do survive. Despite the fact that this site was assigned the name "Part Massum Eyrie" in a previous survey, neither archival nor oral history research has revealed the source for the appellation.

A property description of 1835 notes that this tract was improved with a dwelling "fronting on Three Notched Road and occupied by Charles Raley." The Raley dwelling may have stood on the small field stone foundation that exists underneath the current "Part Massum Eyrie" house. The current structure appears to have been built sometime between 1853 and 1855 when the value of the property increased by five hundred dollars. An advertisement in the St. Mary's Beacon, dated August 26, 1875, describes the property as being improved by a "...comfortable and convenient Dwelling, kitchen, Barns, Stables, and all other necessary outhouses."

During the 1940s the house was converted into apartments for workers on the Patuxent Naval Air Base. It sold to the John K. Fogarty Post #162 of the American Legion Department of Maryland in 1955. When Harold and Doris Bracken purchased the house in 1964, it was in a greatly deteriorated condition. They replaced the west elevation of the house, the floor, the original plaster and all the windows. They also rebuilt the roof, placing it on a steeper pitch than the original. Within the course of reworking the house, the Brackens found the remnants of a field stone foundation underneath the structure that measured about three-quarters the size of the current house.

Part Massum Eyrie, is located on the east side of Old Three Notched Road near Lexington Park in St. Mary's County, Maryland. The house is set back from the road. The perimeter of the property is bordered by tall pine trees which block neighboring houses and the trailer park, located to the north of the house, from view. The land on the east side of the house slopes to the east. There are four outbuildings on the property, none of which are contemporary with the main block. The house faces west with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Probably built around 1850, Part Massum Eyrie is a two-story, frame structure supported by an infilled brick pier foundation. The exterior, originally sheathed with weatherboard, is now covered with aluminum siding. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles and the roofline is finished with a boxed cornice. The roof was originally covered with wood shingles and later with corrugated metal. According to the current owners who replaced the roof in the twentieth century, the roof pitch is steeper today than when they purchased the building in 1964. The main block of the house has a side passage, double-pile plan. A slightly shorter two-story kitchen wing addition is attached to the north end of the main block. The kitchen wing has a shallower roof pitch than the main block and is supported by a continuous brick foundation. The two-story addition on the south end of the house is stepped back from the main block. It dates to 1908 and is supported by a cement foundation.

The west (main) elevation of the house is pierced by a modern door with a Colonial Revival architrave. To the north, the wall surface is pierced by two six-over-six sash windows with louvered shutters. A cement pad extends in front of the main block. This is all that remains of a porch that once extended across the front of the structure. The second floor is pierced by three six-over-six sash windows with louvered shutters. The 1908 wing to the south is pierced by one two-light window with shutters on the first floor and one forty-eight-over-one sash window with wide surrounds and louvered shutters on the second floor. The two-story kitchen wing to the north is pierced by a modern door and two single-light windows with louvered shutters. A porch supported by wrought iron posts extends across the full width of the first floor. The second floor of the kitchen extends out over the porch roof and is pierced by two six-over-six sash windows with louvered shutters.

The north gable end of the main block is remarkable for its two substantial exterior brick chimneys. A six-over-six sash window with louvered shutters lights the second floor and the eave of the main block gable end. The gable end of the kitchen addition is pierced by two single-light windows with shutters on the first floor and two shuttered six-over-six sash windows on the second floor.

Part Massum Eyrie is significant as an example of mid-nineteenth-century architecture in St. Mary's County. The exterior of the house has been considerably altered over the years with modern replacement materials, but some original interior finishes do survive. Despite the fact that this site was assigned the name "Part Massum Eyrie" in a previous survey, neither archival nor oral history research has revealed the source for the appellation.

In 1812 Henry Taylor was assessed for 100 acres of Abell's Purchase, 249 acres of "Abell's Purchase" and "Price's Chance", 51 acres of "Cow ride", and 4.5 acres of "Ismael House and lot of land." At his death in 1820 he left to his wife and two daughters, Mary Derina and Pamela, all of his estate. Following his wife's death, Mary Derina and Pamela divided their inheritance of land. In 1835 they recorded a deed of partition with Mary receiving 135 acres and Pamela receiving 235 acres.

In the property description of 1835, a dwelling "fronting on Three Notched Road and occupied by Charles Raley" is described as the starting point of the division line between the property of the two sisters. Since Charles Raley had married Mary Derina in 1824, it seems likely that this house would have served as their home. The Raley dwelling may have stood on the small field stone foundation that exists underneath the current "Part Massum Eyrie" house.

Charles Raley died in 1837. One year later Mary Derina took Benedict Magill as her second husband. In 1846 Benedict Magill was assessed for 100 acres of "Abell's Purchase" and portions of "Mount Pleasant" and "Part Salem." In 1853 Magill sold 100 acres of "Poplar Point" and "Abell's Purchase" to Lewis B. Peak for \$100. Two years later, Peak sold the property, including the tract "Cowridge," back to Magill for \$600. This significant change in price suggests that Peak may have constructed a new house on the property between 1853 and 1855.

In 1864, Magill transferred ownership of his 400 acre farm, including "Cowridge," "Poplar Point," and "Abell's Purchase," located north of the road from Park

7.1 Description

The east elevation of the kitchen wing is pierced by two small six-over-six sash windows on the first floor and two six-over-six sash windows on the second floor. A modern, one-story, gable roof addition projects from the first floor of the main block. It is supported by a cinderblock foundation and is lighted by forty-eight-over-one sash windows. The remainder of the main block is pierced by one six-over-six sash window on the first floor. The second floor is pierced by a pair of six-over-six sash windows and two single six-over-six sash windows. The two-story wing to the south of the main block is pierced on the first floor by a sliding glass door that opens onto a wooden deck fitted with an outdoor swimming pool. The second floor is pierced by two six-over-six sash windows.

The south elevation of the 1908 wing is pierced on the first floor by two four-over-four sash windows and by one six-over-six sash window on the second floor. An exterior brick chimney stands next to this gable end elevation. The south side of the main block is lighted on the first floor by one forty-eight-over-one sash window with louvered shutters and wide surrounds. One six-over-six sash window with louvered shutters lights the second floor and the eave of the main block.

The interior of the main block consists of a side stair hall and two large parlors on the north side of the house. The open string stair has rectangular balusters and a delicately turned newel post. The second floor consists of two bedrooms and a hall. The attic is accessible by means of a stair behind a four-panel door with a metal box lock. Some of the studs visible here are reciprocal sawn. The rafters are joined at the apex with pegged mortise and tenon joints. The rafter ends rest on a flat false plate. Cross braces are nailed with mature machine cut nails. The 1908 wing consists of one room on the first and second floors. Access to the first floor room is from a door located behind the stair in the main block. The kitchen wing is constructed of heavy timber framing held together with pegged mortise and tenon joints. It consists of one room on the first floor and an unfinished room on the second floor. Hewn ceiling joists are visible from the first floor of the kitchen. Originally a door on the east wall of the kitchen led to the exterior.

There are four outbuildings on the property. South of the house stands a peacock coop, and a shed roof outbuilding used for storage. On the north side of the house are a cinderblock pump house and a modern outbuilding. A former well, now infilled, is also located on the north side of the house. A barn was originally located on the east side of the house.

8.6 Significance

Hall to the Three Notched Road, and "Part Saulsberry Plains," located south of the road from Park Hall to Three Notched Road, to John F. Magill. John Magill was to hold the property in trust until Benedict paid off his \$2000 debt to Mary Peak. Both Peak and Magill died before the debt was paid, and in 1877 the property was sold as the result of a court decree to Benedict Bond for \$2625. The deed was recorded in the name of Mary B. Bond. An advertisement in the St. Mary's Beacon dated August 26, 1875 describes the property as,

"Couridge, Poplar Point, Abell's Purchase, and Part of Saulsberry Plains... the whole being known as the Home Farm containing in all about 400 acres...located immediately upon Three Notched Road and has upon it comfortable and convenient Dwelling, kitchen, Barns, Stables, and all other necessary outhouses. It is within sight of the beautiful Chesapeake and within a few miles of the Millstone Landing on the Patuxent River from which there are steamers to and from Baltimore three or four times a week and churches, schools, stores, and mills are very convenient. The soil is good and productive and is well adapted to the growth of the stable crops of the county -- corn, wheat, tobacco, etc. There is also a fine young peach orchard in bearing upon the place. The farm is well watered and is also abundantly supplied with valuable timber of varied growth."

From Bond the property passed to Susan Ladd in 1898, and then from Ladd to Adelaide Blick of Baltimore in 1903. George B. Dent's survey of 1903, drawn to accompany the deed to Blick, shows this property and identifies the main dwelling located on "Poplar Ridge." This name for the tract appears to be a combination of the tract names "Poplar Point" and "Cowridge."

Following her husband's declaration of bankruptcy in 1934, Adelaide Blick sold the property to Reuben Darby in 1936. During the 1940s the house was converted into apartments to house workers on the Patuxent Naval Air Base. In 1955, five acres of the 413 acre farm were sold to the John K. Fogarty Post #162 of the American Legion Department of Maryland. The building remained an American Legion hall until 1964.

When Harold and Doris Bracken purchased the house in 1964, it was in a greatly deteriorated condition. They replaced the west elevation of the house, the floor, the original plaster and all the windows. They also rebuilt the roof, placing it on a steeper pitch than the original. Within the course of reworking the house, the Brackens found the remnants of a field stone foundation underneath the structure that measured about three-quarters the size of the current house.




