Murrays' Log Tobacco Barn is chiefly significant as one of the few surviving nineteenth century examples of the single crib log barn. Single crib tobacco barns of horizontal log construction were common up to the 1860s and 1870s. Yet, few of these barns have survived or have been documented. Built during the second quarter of the nineteenth century, the central crib of the Horse Landing Barn has maintained a high level of architectural integrity. The roof system of this mature cut nail barn is also distinguished by its unusually late example of the tilted false plate.

Murrays' Log Tobacco Barn is located at the end of Horse Landing Road, a dirt road which extends from the paved De La Brooke Road, runs parallel to the Patuxent River, and curves behind the barn. Originally, this road extended five miles to the west until it connected with Mt. Zion Church Road, formerly known as Dobie Road. The barn is situated on the highest point of a ridge in the landscape and is surrounded by old tobacco fields. Coatigan Run, formerly "Murry's Creek," is located on the south side of the barn. The Patuxent River and the western shore of Calvert County are visible from the Log Barn site. The gable roofline of Murrays' Log Tobacco Barn follows the north/south orientation of the ridge.

Although the barn stands alone on the site, two tobacco barns and a stripping shed are located at the base of the ridge. One of these barns dates to the late nineteenth century, while the second barn and the shed are twentieth century structures. It is unclear where the farm complex contemporary with Murrays' Log Tobacco Barn was originally located.

The barn is a long triple crib barn consisting of a second quarter of the nineteenth century central section, and two later nineteenth century additions on the north and south ends. The oldest section of the barn is a central, single crib structure of horizontal log construction which measures 20' square. The southern addition measures 34' by 20', and the northern addition measures 30' by 20'. Since the roof pitch of both the additions and the central section of the barn are the same, the roofline of the barn appears continuous. The barn is sheathed with plain vertical board siding and roofed with corrugated metal sheeting.

The organizational plan of the barn's central section consists of three 4' rooms and a fourth 5'5" room with a single door centered on the west facade. Each of the additions consist of six rooms which average about 5' in width. A single door centered on the west elevation of each addition provides access to the interior space.

The horizontal log construction of the barn's central section consists of cedar logs which have been partially skinned and saddle-notched into place. The ends of these logs are not trimmed and protrude between the vertical sheathing boards of the north and south elevations. No foundation was employed here and the logs of this central section rest on the dirt floor.

The roof is the only section of this crib which displays any carpentry work. The roof consists of pole rafters on two-foot centers with collars on alternate rafter pairs.

Murrays' Log Tobacco Barn has a history of use from its construction in the second quarter of the nineteenth century until the mid-twentieth century. Located on a ridge overlooking the Patuxent River, this tract of land was described in an 1841 deed to William O. Reeder as "a part of Dela brook manor, called and known by the name of Murrys." There is no patent or certificate of survey for a tract by this name on record at the Maryland Archives or in the Dent or Tippet survey books which might explain the origin of this tract name or plat its original boundaries. Yet, it is unclear whether this barn stood as an isolated landmark on the landscape or as one of a series of agricultural buildings which comprised a tenant farm or the William Reeder home farm. Although no dwelling stands near the barn today, the current owners note that a log house once stood on a second ridge closer to the river which may have been contemporary with the barn. This house burned in the 1960s.

Despite its apparent isolation, this site has a history as an active landing and public wharf. According to the current owners, Horse Landing is so named because this is one of the sites where British troops disembarked horses, soldiers, and supplies prior to their successful raid on the United States Capitol in the War of 1812. In 1849 this landing became important as a public wharf where St. Mary's County tobacco was shipped to Baltimore warehouses. Steamboats stopped at this wharf during the twentieth century and the old steamboat pier continues to extend into the Patuxent River from Horse Landing today. The current owners also note that evidence of Native American occupation, in the form of projectile points and oyster shells, can be found in the field next to Horse Landing Creek.

7.1 Description

Diagonal windbraces reinforce the roof. The rafters are pegged together and rest on a tilted false plate. Originally sheathed with wood shingles, the barn's shingle nailers remain in place. Some of these nailers are riven.

The structural system used to hang tobacco in the barn's central section consists of four posts which rest on the ground at approximately 4' intervals. These intermediate tier pole supports are nailed to the tie beams and form a row down the central axis of the barn. Nailed to these supports are tier poles laid horizontally in transverse rows across the interior space. The ends of the tier poles are wedged between the horizontal logs of the barn's north and south walls.

The entry to the barn's central section measures 6'4" in height by 5' 6" in width. The bottom log of the structural frame is continuous and forms the entry sill. Similarly, a log forms the lintel. The entrance jambs are plain boards attached to the log framing with wire nails. A vertical board hinged with machine made metal hinges on the south side of the entry is all that remains of an entrance door to this crib.

The south addition consists of skinned logs which act as the principal posts. These posts rest on the ground and support hewn top plates. The top plates on the crib's east and west walls are threaded through the horizontal logs of the barn's central section.

The roof system is a common rafter roof on four foot centers reinforced with diagonal wind braces. The rafters rest on a flat false plate.

The structural system used to hang tobacco in the southern addition consists of horizontal rails nailed to the interior face of the crib's exterior walls. Intermediate tier pole supports rest on the ground, forming a row down the barn's central axis. Wedged into these poles at a 45 degree angle are wooden pegs which support the tier poles.

The entry to the southern addition is 7' in height and 6' 3" in width. A principal post acts as the southern side of the entrance door jamb, and a horizontal tier pole support acts as the lintel to the entry.

The structural system of the northern addition consists of hewn and milled principal posts which rest on the ground and support hewn top plates. The northeast and northwest corner posts are braced with diagonal posts. Unlike the southern addition, this crib has corner posts which stand next to the horizontal log crib. The top plates are then mortise and tenoned into these wooden posts and reinforced with a wooden peg.

The roof system consists of a common rafter roof on four foot centers. The

rafters rest on a flat false plate. This section of the roof is in poor condition.

The structural system used to hang tobacco consists of intermediate tier pole supports which rest on the ground and form a row down the central axis of the barn. These supports are nailed to the tie beams. A hole is bored through these poles at each tier pole level. The tier poles extend horizontally through these holes in transverse rows across the crib's interior space.

The entry to the western addition is 9'2" in height by 7' 3" in width. Two principal posts act as the jambs to the entry and a siding nailer acts as the lintel. The vertical siding on the south side of this entry is pierced with a pintel hole at its base and with a remaining pintel near the lintel. A machine made metal hinge is also attached to this plank.

The barn is sheathed with circular sawn, random width 1" vertical boards. Horizontal rails are nailed to the principal posts of the north addition and act as nailers for the vertical siding. Some of these rails are half-lapped and nailed with mature machine cut nails to the principal posts. The south addition's horizontal tier pole supports and siding nailers are the same members.

The barn has been altered with the resheathing of the roof with corrugated metal. According to the current owner, the barn's gable roof was originally covered with large wood shingles about 3' long by 6" wide. Most of the top plates in the north and south end additions are replacements.

8.3 Significance

In the mid-twentieth century, Horse Landing became the center of Leonard Copsey's oysterhouse. For thirty years Copsey transported these oysters by truck to markets in Baltimore and Frederick, Maryland. Although the Copsey oysterhouse is no longer in operation, Horse Landing continues to be occupied by the Drift Inn Crabhouse, established by the Copsey family in 1955.

"Beginning for the same at the gate near a large Chestnut tree, where a stone is placed as a boundary of C. Morgan and running with the fence, northwest from the stone to a small branch, the first one that is reached, thence down the center of the said branch to De La Brooke line; thence running easterly with the Channel of Horse Landing Creek to the Patuxent River, thence running southeasterly with the Patuxent River to the lot of Lewis Copsey, thence running southeasterly with the Patuxent River to the lot of Lewis Copsey, thence running from said Lewis Copsey's lot with the Patuxent River to Murrys Creek, thence with the Channel of Murrys' Creek to a point or stone opposite the branch leading up to the property of the late Reeder on the horse shoe bend, thence to the branch and with this branch to the fence of said Morgan land and thence with a fence southwest to the Chestnut tree or stone, to the place of beginning, containing 227 acres, more or less."

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
