This substantial frame house, enlarged and modernized over the years, was originally built in a design similar to other houses of the black farmers/watermen in Beachville, i.e., a two-story main block with one room downstairs, two upstairs and a kitchen attached to a gable end. According to George S. Carroll, a life-long resident of Beachville, this house was built in the late 1890's by John Woodland, one of the few black farmer<sup>s</sup>/watermen to build his own house rather than hiring a local carpenter. Later the house was purchased successively by two sons of Samuel E. Carroll, whose property was adjoining.

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**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This large handsome house is today the largest house in the Beachville community. It faces west toward the dirt drive (that was once known as Gum Landing Rd.) that leads to the Richard Medley House (STMA-289). According to George S. Carroll (STMA-283), this house was originally similar in size and plan to the other one and a half story, balloon frame houses built in the 1890's as part of the settlement of black families. In fact, it was smaller than the Butler House (STMA-283). It had one room downstairs (sitting room) and a gable end kitchen, with sleeping quarters for the parents and girls in the upstairs of the principal block and for the boys above the kitchen.

The house has been considerably enlarged. A shed screen porch has been added along the entire facade of the original house, and a small shed room (bathroom) attached to the northern gable end. The kitchen and the roof of the principal block have been raised to two stories, and a two story L attached to the northern side of the rear length. The weatherboards have also been covered by tar paper siding in the design of tan bricks. As at the Richard Medley House, the result of the changes is that the living space within the house has been more than doubled, illustrating the trend in houses from the 19th into the 20th centuries of an increase in the amount of space within the house, and an increase in the division of that space into separate rooms for specific functions, such as cooking, dining, sleeping, working, and socializing formally or informally.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to George S. Carroll, this house was first built as the residence of John Woodland, who was the first of the black settlers to build his home in this area. The deed for the property was recorded in 1897 (J.J.G. 5/67)- this is later than that of Richard Medley's land (1890). Woodland's deed, however, may not have been registered until some years after the land purchase, so Carroll may be correct. In the first quarter of the 20th century (according to Carroll), the property was purchased by Willie Carroll, the son of Samuel Carroll whose property is adjacent (STMA-284), and the house was considerably enlarged by him.

This house and its improvements reflects the upward mobility and prosperity which some blacks who were able to find a suitable occupation and income were able to enjoy. Interestingly enough, this house, according to Carroll, was originally smaller than the Christopher Butler house.


