DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This abandoned frame house stands at the end of a dirt drive that cuts through the fields that the occupants of the house once farmed. The house faces south across the fields and toward the Mechanicsville-Chaptico Rd. Behind it stand several small frame sheds and to the east are a corn^c and several large, frame, modern tobacco barns. Only the barns remain in use. To the west of the house is a mobile home occupied by Lloyd Co ntee and, his wife, and their grandchildren. Co ntee and his wife raised their children at this "home place".

This structure consists of a 1 and 1/2 story block with a 1 story wing attached to its west gable end. Behind the wing is a small one room kitchen. All of these parts are of one build. A front porch has been added to the facade. The frame is of the post and beam type; its members cut by a circular saw and fastened by cut nails. The frame was sheathed by overlapping weatherboards that are now covered with red "brick-tex" synthetic siding.

The principal block is two bays in length, and one bay in depth. The wing is three bays in length, equidistantly placed from each other. Each of the three rooms downstairs was heated, the kitchen and the room in the main block (which was a bedroom) by wood stoves and the room in the wing which was to become the "sitting room" by a large brick fire-box now sealed with tin sheeting. The firebox is surrounded by a matelpiece of rather awkward design and manufacture but with Greek Revial aspirations. A stove pipe has been let into the wall above it, showing that the stove was added.

The upstairs of the main block and the wing served as two bedrooms, according to Mr. Co ntee, and were unheated. The ceiling was sealed by plank siding, as were the walls of the house. The trims around the doors were unpainted, and plain, but were made more stylish in appearance by the recessed moldings of bold concentric circles in the upper corners. This molding appears to have been inexpensive and available, and became very popular among those white and black folk in southern Maryland who had some surplus money to decorate their house beyond bare structural simplicity.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to Mr. Countee, this house was occupied by both white and black tenant families since the early 1900's. Structural evidence is inconclusive for dating purposes. For a tenant house, it is large in size when compared to other tenant dwellings surveyed, and its living space is divided into rooms for specific purposes. All of the its building materials are purchased, and it shows more stylish features in its woodwork. These features suggest that this tenant house is not antebellum, but is instead no earlier than the 1870's. Its local reputation as an "old house" in the early 1900's indicates that it was built no later than 1890. .
