The Golden Hotel, also known as the Graves Hotel, is significant as one of the few summer resorts built to serve an African American clientele in St. Mary's County. Both the two-story hotel building, built around 1915, and the cottages are little altered. Like the nearby Shirley K Hotel, which also served out-of-county African American vacationers, the buildings are vacant and in a greatly deteriorated condition.

John and Mary Golden purchased this 16 acre tract located on St. Patrick's Creek for \$1600 in 1913. Initially, the Golden simply hosted a few boarders in their home here. The success of the small scale operation led them to build a two-story, frame hotel building around 1915. Visitors stayed for the day, for the week, and for the month. Later, the Golden's built guest cottages and a dance hall and bar room pavilion over the water. The hotel was able to host about 100 people, although up to 200 and 300 guests might visit for the day or to attend evening dances and special events.

From John and Mary Golden, the property passed to their daughter Josephine Morton. At her death in 1953 she willed the hotel to the Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church of Washington stipulating that funds generated by the hotel be set apart as the Mary V. and John E. and Josephine Golden Morton Fund. This fund was to be used for the education of "young colored men in the Episcopal ministry." The church retained ownership of the property until 1956 when they sold it to Harry and Mildred Graves. The Graves renamed the summer resort the "Graves Hotel." Postcards bearing that name show the cottages and a boat pier and describe the hotel as the destination for the "Discriminating Vacationist." The Graves sold the property to Yale and Margaret Lewis in 1968. By 1974 the hotel had ceased to operate.

The Golden Hotel is located on the east side of Route 242 near Coltons Point in St. Mary's County, Maryland. The two-story, frame structure is in a greatly deteriorated condition. Five one-story cottages are located south of the hotel. The hotel faces south with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

The Golden Hotel, built around 1915, consists of a two-story main block and a one-story kitchen wing attached to the north elevation. The hotel is supported by a brick pier foundation and sheathed with german siding. The roof is covered with corrugated metal. Two metal stove pipes or vent pierce the roof ridgeline. Exposed rafter feet are visible on both longitudinal elevations.

The south (main) elevation is pierced by two pairs of four-panel double doors. The door on the west end of the elevation is flanked on either side by one six-over-six sash window. The door on the east end is flanked by a bank of four six-over-six sash windows on the west and by one six-over-six sash window on the east. A porch extends across the full width of this elevation and wraps around to the west side of the hotel. The porch has a cement floor and a shed roof broken by cross gables centered above the two pairs of entrance doors. The porch is enclosed by a four foot cement block wall and screening. Square posts extend from the wall to support the roof. The second floor of the hotel is pierced by seven six-over-six sash windows with wide surrounds. The roofline is broken by a central cross gable pierced by a louvered vent.

The west elevation is pierced by two six-over-six sash windows with wide surrounds. A shed roof porch. The second floor is pierced by three six-over-six sash windows with wide surrounds and drip moldings. A louvered vent pierces the eave. A shed roof addition, probably covering a mechanical unit, extends from the north elevation. To the east of the shed roof structure is a one-story kitchen wing. The kitchen is pierced by two six-over-six sash windows with wide surrounds and drip molds.

The north elevation of the hotel is pierced by one six-over-six sash window on the first floor. Seven six-over-six sash windows pierce the second floor. The kitchen wing is pierced by a four-panel door and two six-over-six sash windows. An exterior brick chimney stands against this north wall of the hotel.

The east elevation of the kitchen wing is pierced by a door and two six-over-six sash windows. This side of the kitchen is covered by a screened porch. The gable end of the hotel is pierced by three six-over-six sash windows with wide surrounds on the first floor and by two on the second floor. A small, square, shed roof projection,

The Golden Hotel, also known as the Graves Hotel, is significant as one of the few summer resorts built to serve an African American clientele in St. Mary's County. Both the two-story hotel building, built around 1915, and the cottages are little altered. Like the nearby Shirley K Hotel, which also served out-of-county African American visitors, the buildings are vacant and in a greatly deteriorated condition.

In the 1850s this property was part of a much larger tract known as "Dick Harts" and "Blakistone's Pavilion." Owned by George W. Blakistone, Blakistone's Pavilion was a popular summer resort from the 1850s until the 1880s. An advertisement in the St. Mary's Beacon of July 9, 1857 notes "This favorite place of resort is now open for the accomodation of visitors. The Proprietor has engaged a Cotillion Band for the season, and with his splendid Ball room offers great inducements to the lovers of the dance, while those of more quiet humor may find different amusements at the bowling alley, fishing, etc...The Steamers Columbia and Maryland land passengers on every Wednesday and Saturday, and return on every Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday."

Blakistone sold the 185 acre property to John F. Dent in 1858. Thirty years later, J. Marshall Dent, son and executor of the estate of John F. Dent, sold 160 acres of the tract known as "Alyces Lot" to Charles L. Palmer. In 1913, Palmer sold 16 acres situated on "Alsir Cove," a prong of St. Patrick's Creek, to John and Mary Golden of Washington D.C. for \$1600.

During the Golden family's ownership, this property was developed as a summer resort for African American families, many of whom traveled here from Washington D.C. Initially, John and Mary Golden simply hosted a few boarders in their home. The success of the small scale operation led them to build a two-story, frame hotel building around 1915. Visitors stayed for the day, for the week, and for the month. Later, the Golden's built a dance hall and bar room pavilion on the water. The hotel was able to host about 100 people, although up to 200 and 300 guests might visit for the day or to attend evening dances and special events.

7.1 Description

The interior of the hotel consists of one large, open room on the first floor. Four square posts extend from east to west along the central axis of the building to provide support for the second floor. A stair to the second floor is located in the southwest corner of the building. The stair baluster consists of plain, square posts. The second floor has a central hall that runs the full length of the building. Eleven bedrooms open off of this hallway. One bathroom is located in an addition at the east end of the hall. All of the interior woodwork is plain.

The cottages, probably built in the 1930s, are lined up in a row to the southwest of the hotel and face north. They are supported by wood piers and sheathed with vertical board siding. The jerkin head roofs are covered with seamed metal. Each cottage consists of two units. Two five-panel doors flanked by six-light casement windows pierce the north elevation. A small shed roof porch supported by square posts extends across the central entrance bay. The interior of the cottage consists of two rooms separated by a partition wall. Each unit has been fitted with a bathroom.

8.4 Significance

The success of the Golden Hotel led to the construction of another hotel designed to serve African American patrons nearby. In 1942, Ewell L. Conway purchased a two acre tract located on St. Patrick's Creek just north of the Golden Hotel. There he built the twenty-one room Shirley K Hotel, later known as the Colton Country Club, there. This two-story, masonry building is now vacant and deteriorating.

Segregation between African American hotel guests and the local white population was distinct. Guests were instructed by the hotel proprietor not to visit the Colton's Point post office or store, as they were not welcome there. If they wished to take walks, they were encouraged to stroll north on Route 242 rather than south towards the Point.

From John and Mary Golden, the property passed to their daughter Josephine Morton. At her death in 1953 she willed the hotel to the Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church of Washington stipulating that funds generated by the hotel be set apart as the Mary V. and John E. and Josephine Golden Morton Fund. This fund was to be used for the education of "young colored men in the Episcopal ministry." In 1953 the hotel property consisted of four acres of improved land and six acres of cleared land. Improvements included the hotel, a pavilion, five cabins, two houses, three sheds, an ice house, and a boat.

The church retained ownership of the property until 1956 when they sold it to Harry and Mildred Graves. The Graves renamed the summer resort the "Graves Hotel." Postcards bearing that name show the cottages and a boat pier and describe the hotel as the destination for the "Discriminating Vacationist." The Graves sold the property to Yale and Margaret Lewis in 1968. By 1974 the hotel had ceased to operate.



 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This abandoned two story hotel was once the gathering place for Negro families from Washington, Baltimore, and elsewhere in the state and probably in Virginia, who came by train or by boat to Colton Point, a popular week end and summer resort. Though gradually deteriorating from neglect, the structure still shows that during its days of occupancy and use, it was a handsome building. It occupied a lovely site, bounded by water on two sides, to the front (east) and to the side (north).

The building is seven bays across the principal facade (east) and is three bays deep. A shed porch which is screened surrounds the facade and south side. The facade is accented by a broad cross gable pediment. To the rear of the hotel have been attached shed rooms, the largest served as the kitchen. The front doors of the hotel are panelled and have lighted transoms and side lights.

To the southeast of the hotel stands a row of small cottages, that postdate the hotel and that are no longer in service.

This hotel was once a popular week and summer resort for Negroes from Washington, Baltimore, and elsewhere in Maryland and Virginia. No informant or other sources were available to date the building, but it appears to have been built in the 1910's or 20's. It represents the type of building and place at which middle class Negro families would take their vacations.


