The Norman Curtis House is significant as a modest, early twentieth century frame structure built by an African-American tenant farmer. This two-story, two-bay building has changed little over the years. It retains its original weatherboard siding and six-over-six sash windows.

One of a series of modest two-story frame houses located along a ridge on the east side of Route 238, the Curtis house was built in 1935 on property owned by the Swann family. Originally part of a tract known as "Wicomico Fields", Norman and Emma Curtis purchased this three acre lot in 1954.

The Norman Curtis House is located on the east side of Route 238 near Maddox in St. Mary's County, Maryland. The house is located on a ridge above the road and is surrounded by woods on its north, east, and south sides. Four small frame outbuildings extend to the east of the house. The house faces south, with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Constructed for Mr. Curtis in 1935, this frame structure consists of a two-story main block with a one-story addition on the east end. The house is supported by a cinderblock pier foundation. The exterior is sheathed with weatherboard siding. The roof is covered with seamed metal.

The south (main) elevation of the main block is pierced by a central entrance door flanked on either side by a six-over-six sash window with narrow surrounds. A shed roofed, screened porch extends across the first floor of this elevation. The second floor is lit by two six-over-six sash windows with narrow surrounds. An interior brick chimney pierces the south roof slope of the house. Both the roofline of the house and of the porch are finished with exposed rafter feet. The one-story addition to the east of the main block is pierced by an entrance door and one six-over-six sash window with narrow surrounds. An interior brick chimney pierces the roofline of this wing at its eastern end.

The east elevation of the main block is blind. One six-over-six sash window pierces the east end of the kitchen wing.

The north elevation of the one-story wing is lit by one six-over-six sash window. The main block is lit by two six-over-six sash windows on both the first and second floors. The roofline of the main block is finished with exposed rafter feet.

The west elevation is lit by one six-over-six sash window on both the first and second floor.

The interior was not seen.

Four frame outbuildings stand on the property. One of these is an old outhouse with a metal shed roof. Another is a meathouse in poor condition with an asphalt shingle roof. A chicken house with weatherboard siding and a shed roof stands to the east of the meathouse. Two doors pierce the south side of the chicken house. An old granary supported by cement block piers and roofed with metal stands at the eastern edge of the property.

James Roscoe Curtis, the current owner, worked for many years on a tobacco farm located nearby on the west side of Route 238. Curtis is now retired.




