The John Wesley Chapel Site and Cemetery is significant as the site of one of St. Mary's County's earliest African American Methodist churches. To the south of the chapel extends what is probably the largest and oldest African American church graveyards in the County. While the chapel is no longer standing, the many graves are visible either because of engraved stones, field stones, or depressions in the ground which mark their location.

Luke P. Barber, owner of the extensive tract known as "Barber's Enclosure," deeded this acre lot of Barber's Enclosure to the Trustees of the "Colored Methodist Episcopal Church" in 1868. The people who worshipped at the chapel were probably either former members of nearby Bethel Methodist Episcopal Church or former slaves on the Barber property. Today, a pile of rubble stands on the chapel site, behind which extends the unkempt and endangered cemetery.

The John Wesley Chapel Site and Cemetery is located on the south side of Aviation Yacht Club Road near Budd's Creek in St. Mary's County, Maryland. The site is located on a one acre lot surrounded by trees. The Chapel, no longer standing, originally faced north with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis. The cemetery extends south of the Chapel ruins.

Constructed in the late 1800s, the John Wesley Chapel was a one-story, frame building which stood on a brick pier foundation. The exterior was sheathed with german siding and the steeply pitched gable roof was covered with metal. The ruins of the Chapel show that the vertical studs were mortise and tenoned and pegged into place. The Chapel burned in the late 1980s.

The cemetery which extends to the south of the Chapel consists of 110 distinct graves, some of which are marked with either engraved stones or field stones. The majority of the graves are unmarked. The cemetery is in very poor repair.

While the Chapel is no longer standing, the many graves are visible either because of engraved stones, field stones, or depressions in the ground which mark their location.

Luke P. Barber, owner of the extensive tract known as "Barber's Enclosure," deeded this acre lot of Barber's Enclosure to the Trustees of the "Colored Methodist Episcopal Church" in 1868. The people who worshipped at the chapel were probably either former members of nearby Bethel Methodist Episcopal Church or former slaves on the Barber property. The deed suggests that the acre lot was already improved with a building at the time of its transfer.

The John Wesley Chapel was in use until the 1950s. Sometime in the late 1980s or early 1990s, the chapel burned. A pile of rubble stands on the site, behind which extends the unkempt and endangered cemetery.


