Part Fenwick's Manor/Glebe is a significant 1830-1840s braced-frame, one-and-a-half story, side-passage dwelling. The exterior-end chimneys with a central pent and the interior trim were removed in the mid-twentieth century. The overall form and plan remain intact; distinguishing this dwelling as a significant example of a second quarter of the nineteenth century building type. While architecturally significant, the dwelling also has noteworthy associations with several locally prominent families and the Parish of St. Andrews.

Part Fenwick's Manor/Glebe was constructed by William Ford soon after he purchased two tracts of land totalling 108 acres in 1841. Ford died, however, soon after. In 1848, the property was sold to the Vestry of St. Andrews by Ford's executors Henry and Lucretia Ford. The glebe farm proved unproductive as the St. Andrews Register notes that the land was immediately sold to Colonel Chapman and Lydia C. Billingsley on May 9, 1848 for \$1,100. Chapman Billingsley, who served a variety of offices such as Orphan's Court Judge and State Senator, did not receive a deed for the property until May 18, 1852. The dwelling remained in the Billingsley's hands until 1877 when it was sold by Lydia C. Billingsley's executor Thomas Barber to Georgeanna Burroughs for \$705.

Part Fenwick's Manor/Glebe is located 1.2 miles north of the intersection of Old Three Notch and Vista Roads and 0.1 miles north on a dirt track from Vista Road. The house is situated on a small, wooded knoll that sharply drops down to a nearby creek. While on a 6+ acre tract, the building is surrounded by smaller tracts containing modern houses.

Part Fenwick's Manor/Glebe, constructed in the 1830-1840s, is a frame, one-and-a-half story, dwelling with a side-passage, double-pile plan, gable roof, and an interior, brick chimney flue. The entire house rests on a brick pier foundation and is covered with circular sawn clapboard attached to the braced frame with wire nails. The first floor is supported by cedar logs that lie perpendicular to the primary elevation and only extend to the mid-portion of the house where they are laid on a large, square hewn girt. While its original dual, exterior end chimneys with a pent were removed in the mid-twentieth century, the dwelling retains its overall floor plan and form as there has not been any modern additions made.

The west or primary elevation consists of three symmetrically placed bays on the first floor--a panelled door and two, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows. The raised-seam, metal roof is pierced by two gable dormers; each dormer exhibiting a four-over-four, double-hung sash window. The roof terminates in a plain box cornice.

The south elevation or gable-end features two, centrally located, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows--one each on the first floor and attic story. This elevation also exhibits vertical boards that have been placed on parts of this elevation as the clapboard has begun to deteriorate.

The east elevation is similar to the west elevation. Its fenestration also consists of a panelled door and two, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows with plain fascia board trim. This elevation does not exhibit any dormers, but a an interior, brick stove flue pierces the roof near its peak.

The north elevation currently exhibits a modern door and a six-over-six window on the first floor and two, six-over-six windows on the second floor. According to the present owner, this elevation once contained two, exterior end, brick chimneys with a pent in between the stacks. Underneath this pent a door permitted entry into the interior.

While the interior was inaccessible at the time of the visit, the current owner explained the basic plan and interior ornamentation. The passage for the house extends its entire depth and permits entry into all spaces of the house. Two rooms are located immediately to the north of the passage, and a small winder stair, located immediately to the south of the main entrance climbs to an attic story that contains three rooms. The door and window surrounds once exhibited corner blocks decorated with paterae and the entire interior exhibited plaster and lath. All of this decorative detail as well as the mantles have been removed.

Part Fenwick's Manor/Glebe is a significant 1830-1840s braced-frame, one-and-a-half story dwelling. Originally, the dwelling exhibited a pair of exterior-end, brick chimneys with a pent located between them. The interior consists of a side-passage plan with an enclosed stair to the half-story above. The interior windows and doors once contained molded trim and corner blocks decorated with paterae. While the chimneys and interior trim were removed, the overall form and plan remain intact--distinguishing this dwelling as a significant example of a second quarter of the nineteenth century building type. While architecturally significant, the dwelling also has noteworthy associations with several prominent families and the Parish of St. Andrews.

It also mentions that the parcel is "the same land that the late Col. Chapman Billingsley purchased from the Vestry of St. Andrews Church adjoining that part of "Sotterley."
