Constructed c. 1910, the J. B. Love house is a two story, frame, Queen Anne-style dwelling located at the southern corner of Pincushion Road and Maryland Route 5 in Loveville, Maryland. The house is significant for its unique architectural details including its turret, turned porch posts and scroll sawn brackets, open bed, dentilated pediments on the porch, as well as its asymmetrical roof design, clipped cross gables, and dormer windows. As the residence of John Bernard Love, a prominent store owner, local postmaster from 1895-1915, and St. Mary's County Sheriff from 1909-1915, the dwelling also has important associations with local commerce.

According to Mary Vivian Love, current owner of the property, John B. and Grace F. Love hired a local African-American contractor named Peterson to build the house c. 1910. The house, which exhibits two decorated facades on its north and east sides was highly visible to visitors travelling south on Maryland Route 5. The J. B. Love Store, once located just north of the dwelling, served as a gas station, local bar, as well as a general merchandise store. Everything from candy to wedding dresses could be purchased there, making the store a versatile commercial enterprise that could serve the diverse needs of the surrounding rural community. While the store was demolished in 1960, the house remains as a reminder of how crossroads communities appeared and functioned in the early-twentieth century.

The J. B. Love house is located at the south corner of the intersection of Route 5 and Pincushion Road in Loveville, Maryland. The house is situated on a northerly sloping 3.91 acre parcel and is bounded on the west and south by modern one single family residences, to the north by the intersecting roads, and to the east by Route 5. The house is situated near the center of Loveville, a rural crossroads community.

The Love house is a two-story, three bay, frame dwelling with a modified center passage, double-pile plan and an asymmetrical gable roof. The house is situated on a brick foundation. The frame is covered with "German" or beveled-drop siding. The overhanging box cornice features a plain frieze and the roof is covered with raised-seam metal. The house also features a modern one story addition located to the rear.

The east or primary elevation features a central, projecting, three sided turret that encompasses the main entrance. The main entrance is a one-light-over four panel door. The other two sides of the turret feature one-over-one, double-hung sash windows with louvered shutters. This turret is flanked on either side by two-over-two windows. All of these bays are sheltered by a highly decorated wrap around porch. The porch features turned supports with scroll sawn brackets and an open bed pediment with a dentilated cornice that signals the main entrance. A similar detail is repeated at the northeast corner of the porch. The second floor of the east elevation is distinguished by the central three sided turret. Each side of the turret features a one-over-one window. The turret is flanked on either side by two-over-two windows. The attic story is lit by two gable dormers that are located on either side of the turret roof. These dormers feature an open bed pediment that frame a three-part, Palladian arrangement of windows. This arrangement consists of a central two-over-two window with a semicircular crown flanked by a two-over-two sash window. The sides of the dormers are decorated with fishscale siding.

The north elevation is pierced by a central panelled door flanked by a two-over-two window. A similarly decorated porch that features an open bed pediment to highlight the main entrance shades these openings. The second story is pierced by three, two-over-two windows. The middle window, however, is part of a projecting bay. The attic story is lit by a pair of two light, fixed sash windows. Each of these windows is framed by a clipped cross gable with cornice returns. The rear ell does not feature any openings.

The west elevation consists of the main block and the one story rear ell with a hip roof. The ell does not feature any openings and the main block is pierced by a door sheltered by a bracketed eave and a two-over-two window. The second floor is pierced by three, two-over-two windows. The attic story is lit by a two light fixed sash that is framed by a clipped cross gable.

The south elevation of the ell is pierced by a panelled and glazed door but is otherwise unadorned. The main block is pierced by two, two-over-two windows on the first and second floors. The attic is lit by a two light fixed sash framed by a cross gable with an open bed pediment.

The five acre tract where the dwelling is currently located, called Part of Roundabout, was initially purchased by a member of the Love family in 1883. In that year Mary J. Love, wife of Philip J. Love, purchased the parcel for \$3,500 from Sabastian Thompson. After a number of transactions between members of the Love family, Grace Floyd Love, wife of John Bernard Love Sr., received the property in 1919. A deed transferring the property to J. Bernard Love, Jr. in 1938 is the first to note the presence of a store and dwelling.

7.1 Description

The interior is a modified center passage double pile plan. The stair passage features doors to the parlor or living room to the north and the dining room to the south. The passage also permitted entry to the second floor via an open string stair with a turned newel. The passage is a rather large room that could have also served as a sitting room. All of the door surrounds consist of reeded architraves with concentric circle corner blocks. The living room, once divided into two rooms, features a classically inspired mantle while the dining room does not currently feature any provisions for heat. The kitchen located immediately to the rear of the stair passage but entered through doors in the dining room and living room features an enclosed service stair to the second floor. A small pantry is located near the southwest corner of the kitchen.

A pile of overgrown debris located just north of the house represents the remains of J. B. Love's Store, Gas Station, and Bar. A c. 1938 photograph reveals that the building was a one story frame structure with a gable roof and several gable end wings. The building was very similar to the Bullock Store and gas station located to the north on Route 5 in Loveville.




