In 1905 Attaway Garner commissioned carpenter John J. Dean to build the residence called "Chickahominy" (SM-216) located just north of Bushwood Wharf on the Wicomico River. Dean was no doubt familiar with modern building conventions as the expansive dwelling was encrusted with architectural details derived from the Colonial Revival style. In payment for Dean's labors, Garner transferred 11 3/4 acres from the Chickahominy estate to Dean so that he could build a dwelling of his own. Soon after the transaction Dean constructed a two story, three bay, center passage, single pile, frame dwelling on the new parcel.

Judging from surviving architectural evidence, the Dean House did not receive the decorative attention that was demanded at Chickahominy, but was instead a more modestly executed building that made use of the most modern building materials. The most distinctive characteristics include its original German siding exterior, the projecting pavilion on the front elevation with corresponding cross gable, and its interior wall coverings that were composed almost entirely of decorative pressed tin much like that found at the Fennie and Mazie Bailey House (SM-629). Today, enough architectural evidence remains to appreciate the original appearance of the Dent House -- an appearance that was no doubt an expression of his carpentry work to the local community. The house remained in the Dean family until 1929 when it was sold.

The Dean House is located on the north side of Bushwood Road about 20 yards from its intersection with Bushwood Wharf Road near the rural crossroads community of Bushwood, Maryland. Oriented on a north/south axis, the building is situated on a flat 6.03 acre parcel. The house is bordered by residential lots to the east and west, by the road to the south, and by an overgrown parcel to the north. Approached via a shot dirt drive from Bushwood Road, the house features a front yard enclosed by a wire fence. The combination of bushes and evergreen and deciduous trees in the front yard help to frame the house's primary elevation.

The Dean House, constructed in 1909-1910, is a two story, center-passage, L-plan, frame dwelling with symmetrical fenestration. Originally erected on a brick pier foundation that was later filled in and covered over with later bricks, the circular sawn frame is currently sheathed with asbestos shingles. These newer shingles cover over the original "German" siding that was fastened with mature cut nails. At the juncture of the wall and roof is a box cornice. Pierced by two interior and one interior end brick chimney flues with corbelled tops, the gable roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles.

The primary or south elevation is dominated by a central pavilion that projects from the main block of the building. A porch that originally shaded the first floor of the projection has been enclosed. This enclosed porch has a central door that exhibits a palladian window on either side. Each of the windows is composed of a central picture window flanked on each side by a four-over-four, double-hung sash window. The original entry, presently enclosed by the porch, is a three-light-over-three-panel door. This was flanked on either side by a two-over-two window. The window on the east side has been removed and covered over. A two-over-two window lies on either side of the pavilion. The second floor of the pavilion is pierced by three two-over-two windows with similar sash on either side of the projection. The attic story is pierced by a two-over-two window with a semi-circular crown. The pavilion is further accentuated by cornice returns and a later scrollsawn vergeboard.

The east elevation consists of the main block's gable end, the side of a one story modern addition, and the side of the rear ell. The main block is pierced on the first and second floors by a two-over-two window. The addition, sheathed with vinyl siding, is lit by a palladian window that consists of a large one-over-one window flanked on either side by a slender one-over-one window. The second floor of the rear ell exhibits a one-over-one window.

The north elevation consists of the rear of the main block, addition, and ell. The addition has a similar palladian window with a larger sash flanked by more slender windows accompanied by two, swinging casement windows. Two windows light the second floor of the main block. The ell has a door (previously a window) shaded by a hipped roof porch. The porch is rimmed by a balustrade interspersed by turned porch posts.

The west elevation is composed of the main block's gable end and the ell's side. The ell is pierced by a casement window on the first floor and a one-over-one window on the second floor. The main block has a two-over-two window on the first and second floor.

7.1 Description

Like several houses erected in the early-twentieth century in St. Mary's County, the Dean house exhibits a center passage plan. Turned balusters, a chamfered newel, and molded handrail embellish the stair itself, but one of the most distinctive features of the passage and other first floor rooms is the use of decorative pressed metal to cover the walls. Elaborately adorned with fleur-de-lis, medallions, and other geometric shapes, the metal walls convey impressed-metal's popularity in the early twentieth century. Other dwellings and buildings such as the Fennie and Mazie Bailey House (SM-629), Bushwood Post Office (SM-608), are other examples of its use. Parlor's, entered through panelled doors with casement transoms, each feature the use of pressed tin and each have period mantels although they are not original to the house. Like the mantels, much of the bulls-eye trim was reused from a now demolished house. A kitchen is situated directly in back of the west parlor. Mimicking the floor plan of the first floor, the second floor features three bedrooms.




