Constructed in the 1840s on a farm owned by the Jesuit Order since the seventeenth century, this substantial tobacco barn exhibits several rare construction details and forms that distinguish it from other barns built during the same period. Like earlier barns such as the Prospect Hill Tobacco House (SM-641) and the De La Brooke Tobacco Barn (SM-411), the Barn at St. Inigoes features an entry on each of its gable ends with sheds on the other two sides. Another interesting survival is the clapboard siding that remains on the two gable ends. While used on later barns such as the Hanover Farm Barn (SM-194), planters began employing plank vertical siding as a more cost effective alternative.

The interior of the barn currently consists of a raised plank floor bisected by a transverse cartway. Here the braced framing is readily seen. Composed of pit sawn and hewn timbers most major structural members are conventionally joined with mortise-and-tenons. One interesting deviation from the norm is the presence of up rather than down braces as the primary means of stability. The interior also features a vertical tobacco prize built in the 1890s. The presence of several other vertical prizes in neighboring barns reveals that the late-nineteenth century tenant farmers on the Jesuit farm preferred this mechanism over the horizontal prize which remained the dominant way to pack tobacco in the rest of the county.

Lying in a soybean field on the east side of Beachville Road is the Barn at St. Inigoes. Located approximately 1 mile south of the intersection of Beachville and Grason Roads, the barn is near the rural crossroads community of St. Inigoes, Maryland. The environment surrounding the barn is characterized by flat agricultural fields to the east and north, Beachville Road and Webster Field to the west, and a wooded tract to the south. A mid-twentieth century tenant house lies just to the east of the barn and is approached via a dirt road that extends eastward from Beachville Road.

The Barn at St. Inigoes is a frame, gable front, axial plan tobacco house constructed c. 1840. Erected on a rubblestone foundation, the braced-frame consists of oak pit-sawn and hewn members. These members are clad on two gable ends with horizontal clapboard siding while the other two sides feature vertical boards. The cornice has been left open and the roof is sheathed with raised-seam metal. Changes to the building include modifications to the barn's circulation and structure in the early twentieth centuries.

The west gable end is clad with sawn clapboard attached to the frame with mature cut and wire nails. This side exhibits a single door entry with the door no longer extant. A louvered vent, obscured by exterior vines, is situated near the roof peak. The north elevation is sheathed with vertical boards and features a double door tractorway. The east gable end is similar to the west gable end in that it has a single door entry and a louvered vent. The lone difference lies in the use of vertical planks between the vent and roof peak. The south side, like the north elevation, has vertical siding and a double door tractorway.

The barn's interior configuration is composed of a central main block with flanking sheds. The primary entries into the barn were originally located at either gable end, but changes in the barn's circulation resulted in the construction of a transverse tractorway entered from either the north or south sides. In transforming the circulation to a cross-axial plan, a floor was added on either side of the tractorway in the main block. Transverse sills stabilized with scabbed down braces aid in supporting the floor. The floor probably facilitated the hanging and prizing of tobacco. Interestingly, a vertical tobacco prize still exists within the main block.

The frame of the barn consists of hewn sills that are mortised at each corner. Evidence for the original transverse sills is currently obscured by the floor. The studs that extend on all four sides of the main block are set on two foot centers to accommodate the horizontal siding on the east and west sides and cribbing fastened with mature cut nails on the north and south sides. Robbed mortises on the underside of the south and north wall plate indicate where studs were removed and/or reinstalled in order to accommodate the wider tractorway. Scabbed timbers from another structure were used as the headers. The wall plate, itself, is a hewn member that supports a series of structural ties set on four foot centers. These ties are half-lapped over the plate and support a series of "swinging tiers" that consist of two members that lie about eight inches apart but held together by a series of pegs set at regular intervals. These supports allow three tiers of tobacco poles to extend the full width of the barn. These poles, in turn, create 10 "rooms" for the hanging of tobacco. The aforementioned wall ties support a thick, flat false plate that carries the feet of the common rafters. Each of the rafter pairs are connected by two half lapped collars that can also serve as tobacco poles and at the peak by a half-lapped joint. Both of the sheds appear to have been reconstructed in the early twentieth century as they are built of circular sawn timbers. Some of the rafters, however, appear to be original.





8.1 Significance

Chain-of-Title

The Barn at St. Inigoes lies on property that has been owned by the Jesuit Order since between 1634-1638. Originally patented for 2000 acres, the property presently contains just over 900 acres. (For more information concerning the chain-of-title for the property see Edward Beitzell's The Jesuit Missions of St. Mary's County, Maryland (Abell, Md: n.p., 1976). The tobacco barn was erected c. 1840 during their ownership.
