



One of the most unique features of this 1 1/2-story, gambrel-roofed frame house was the exposure of the back wall of the chimney stacks on the clapboard ends. As at Deep Falls (1745), the chimney base formed a solid wall at the ground-floor level and had three separate pent closets with arched windows between the fireplace openings.

This view is of NEALE'S HILL with pent to one side of the chimney. James Neale, Lord of Wolleston Manor, was the founder of the Neale family in Maryland in 1642. He was Head of his Lordship's Treasury, and a Deputy-Governor.

Another dwelling with pent to one side of the chimney is "Windsor Forest", old home of Col. Heard in St. Mary's County.
