The Stone House, probably constructed circa 1880, is a two story frame dwelling with a one story wing that lies on the banks of Tomakokin Creek, a tributary of St. Clements Bay and ultimately the Potomac River. Standing at the end of a long farm lane, the house appears to be in a dilapidated condition and is abandoned. While the integrity of the house is threatened, the house deserves further investigation to ascertain whether or not it contains an earlier period building. The undeveloped nature of the neighborhood makes the Stone farm as well as the house and farm at 39128 Cobrum's Wharf Farm (SM-772) particularly good examples of farmsteads from the late-nineteenth or early twentieth centuries.

The Stone House is located on the north side Cobrum's Wharf Road near Oakley, Maryland. Situated on a large cultivated tract consisting of approximately 105 acres, the property is topographically flat. Only about five acres were surveyed due to the house's distance from the road. The property probably does have more standing historic resources on it, but were not visible from the road. The house is oriented on a south/north axis and is approached via a long dirt road. The property is bounded by Tomakokin Creek to the north, Cobrum's Wharf Road to the south, and agricultural and wooded tracts to the east and west.

The house itself is a two story, three bay frame dwelling with a one story wing that appears to lie to the east. The exterior walls appear to be covered with clapboard and the roof is clad with metal. The primary or south elevation is entirely shaded by a porch supported by a series of square posts. While shielding the fenestration of the first floor, the second floor of this gable front dwelling is pierced by three windows. Judging from the overall massing, the house appears to have been built circa 1880.

No other elevations were investigated.
