The All Saints Rectory, constructed circa 1914, reveals the attempts of All Saints Parish to retain a permanently residing minister for this relatively rural and isolated parish.

Built in close proximity to All Saints Parish Hall (SM-632), the rectory is presently a private dwelling as the current minister's house is situated to the northwest and across Oakley Road. Although no longer owned by All Saints, the rectory still adequately recalls how this parish functioned in the early twentieth century. Situated at least one mile south of All Saints Church (SM-124), the rectory and hall were situated in a decentralized manner to better serve the scattered parish. Further documentation of the rectory is necessary to ascertain just how long it served as the minister's home and how it has been altered over time.

The All Saint Rectory is located immediately south of All Saints Parish Hall (SM-632) in the rural community of Oakley, Maryland. Situated on the south side of Oakley Road, the Rectory is oriented on an east/west axis and is approached via a short dirt drive that extends south of the main road. The property is bounded by All Saints Parish Hall to the north, cultivated fields and a wooded lot to the east and south, and to west by a residential lot.

The Rectory itself, is a two story, two bay, frame dwelling with a modified L-shaped plan. Constructed circa 1914, the house also features a one story addition to the south.. The exterior walls are clad with artificial siding while the roof is covered with decorative, pressed-metal shingles. The east or rear elevation is pierced on the first floor by a two-over-two, double-hung sash window with louvered shutters and a small, more modern one-over-one window also with shutters. Both of these bays are shaded by wrap-around porch supported by wood posts resting on brick bases. The porch is further elaborated by scroll sawn brackets. The one story addition features an enclosed porch that is presently pierced by six, one-over-one windows. The second floor of the main block is pierced by two two-over-two windows.



