A small, three bay dwelling, this two-and-a-half story brick structure is one of the town's finest Federal period buildings. The Flemish bond facade is enriched with a belt course and double keystone lintels at window openings. The main entrance is outstanding; fluted pilasters carry an entablature decorated with Adamesque pineapples and sunbursts. The transom light has diamond panes, a detail also used inside the building.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This three bay building stands on South Washington Street at the end of South Street. It faces east.

Two-and-a-half stories in height it is covered by a gable roof. A brick ell, two stories in height and two bays long at the rear of the main portion of the structure may be contemporary with it. The structure has been joined to its northern neighbor, another Federal period building, #107 South Washington Street, (T-442).

The brick is laid in Flemish bond on the front facade and Liverpool bond on the side and rear ell. The front facade is now painted light grey. A stuccoed belt course, three brick courses wide, crosses the facade at the second floor level.

The main entrance is found in the north bay. The structure's most notable feature, the opening is framed with fluted pilasters carrying an entablature decorated with Adamesque pineapples and sunbursts; a row of stylized leaf-designs surmounts the cornice. There is a transom light with diamond panes and a six panel door.

Flat-arch window openings have a double keystone lintel with chiseled reedings and flutings. Beaded frames with a quarter-round backbond molding hold six over six sashes. Louvered shutters painted dark green are used on the second floor. First floor shutters each have three raised and beveled panels; they are white. The windows on the second floor are most likely original; those on the first floor replaces a store front which was removed when the structure was restored in 1969.

The box cornice is finished with the usual crown molding; a line of wooden ornament chiseled in an intricate but deep chain motif is used in the position of the bed molding. Brick roof curtains terminate the gable roof which is covered with black asphalt shingles. A tall double chimney with a corbelled cap is enclosed within the south wall.

There are no window openings in the south wall. A small window in the upper floor on the north facade was covered over when #107 South Washington Street (T-443) was built.

The ell has a gable roof and evenly spaced windows with six over six sashes. Like the main portion of the house the window has a backbond molding.

Inside the woodwork in major rooms is well preserved and quite elegant. Throughout the building the chair rails have gouge work, with six-pointed stars alternating with flutings. Interior doors have raised and beveled panels with diagonal, beaded boarding on the back. Transom lights with diamond-shaped panes are used for major interior doors.

The second floor of this building and #107 are connected and used as one apartment. They are served by a single stair which is located in the ell of this structure adjacent to the party wall, and was evidently installed after the second structure was erected. It is unusually heavy for a structure of this period. Plain balusters and a turned newel with a squared cap are used on the open-string course.

The second floor front room of this dwelling can only be described as elegant: chair rails and mantles display gouge work carving. Windows and doors have paneled jambs. The floors are smoothly finished with

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The structure is significant for its architecture. A well-proportioned structure it shows influence of both the Federal and Georgian periods in its exterior treatment and may be considered to be a transitional building. Its doorway is one of the few remaining in the town of Easton which retains the Adamesque sunburst detailing favored during the Federal period in this country. This structure also contains much early interior detailing, including extremely fine woodwork. Providing a beautiful terminus to South Street, this structure is one of the finest Federal row buildings on Washington Street and one of the best preserved.

These two properties were put together as one in 1821 when Theodore Denny bought the southern portion of the double house. Hugh Martin had built #109. It was standing in 1809 according to a description deed for the property adjoining on the north. But it is unclear just when Martin built his house. However, Martin was forced to sell his home. James Earle, Jr. was appointed the trustee for the creditors of Hugh Martin and John Harwood contracted to buy the property, but his decease put it in the hands of John Goldsborough to sell it to Theodore Denny.

In 180 $\frac{1}{2}$, James Willson bought the lot from James Earle, Jr. on which he had lately erected a two-story brick building. The lot measured only 15 feet $7\frac{1}{2}$ inches along Washington Street though it had a depth of 147 feet. Peter Denny, father of Theodore, bought the house and lot in 1809 for \$2513.00.



The two houses became one property in 1821 and have remained so. It eventually came into the possession of James Spence in 1914. He willed it to his daughter, now Mrs. William Platte, who is the present owner. For a time, the ground floor area was commercialized, but has lately been restored to its original facade, and is being used as apartments.






EDMUNDSON NECK
