DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fernwood is a large two and one-half story brick house, five bays long and one room deep with brick chimneys rising from within the two gables. Its north facade is laid in Flemish bond above the plain water table and English bond below. English bond is used on the south and common on the west gable. There are segmental arches above two basement windows of the north facade and all first story openings, although they have been altered slightly. A twentieth century porch extends across three of the five bays. A two brick belt course extends across the north facade only. The central bay of the second story was a door at one time, possibly original.

Set back from the east gable is a 1960 wing. An outline of an earlier wing is visible on the gable. Due to the poor quality of the brickwork it might be conjectured that the wing pre-dated the house or that the interior of the wing was intended to be plastered from the beginning.

On the west gable are four small bricked up windows typical of the mid 18th century and like Troth's Fortune and White Marshes. Two seams even with the outside dimensions of the chimney continue to the attic floor level. The brick in the gable, beside the chimney is newer, like the 1870 wing. It suggests the possibility of there having originally been a hip roof. Interior structure and lack of period stair to attic confirm the hypothesis.

Extending in an 'L' on the east side of the south facade is a two story brick wing (original frame) added c. 1870 when the roof was altered and stair to attic installed. East of the wing is an addition and porch added in 1960.

The interior of the original part of the house consists of a central stair hall with two rooms. The stair is original to the first period which appears to be the second quarter of the 18th century. Its open string has three turned balusters per step and a bold handrail which curves over the intermediate newels, like Boston Cliff. There is a paneled spandrel which matches the raised panel dado. The doors and trim appear to date from c.1870.

West of the hall, the living room contains 18th century raised paneling on the chimney breast which was installed here in 1960 but was taken from the old Dover Ferry House. There is original paneled wainscot, window sections and jambs. Unique to this house are the curved corners of the seats with fluting in the curve. New trim was installed around the windows in 1960.

On the other side of the hall, the dining room retains original panels at the north windows, but the remainder was altered.

The 1870 wing is now a family room, but was a kitchen with fireplace on its east wall. Only the base remains of the fireplace.

The second story rooms are similar to the first but are plainer. A corridor runs behind the dining room chamber to service the other rooms in the 1870 and 1960 wings.

As mentioned above, the stair to the attic is entirely different than the original and was installed when the third story was added.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Fernwood is a very important dwelling dating from the second quarter of the 18th century due primarily to the fact that it originally had a hip roof. This type roof was not uncommon in the period but none have survived in Talbot and only one is known to have existed at Perry Hall, and that on a one story house. It is also a relatively large dwelling for that early period and must have been the product of a very prosperous gentleman and his family and holdings. It is also important architecturally because of the original paneling and stair of the first period which have some details in common with other houses in Talbot.




