STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The dwelling originally was a frame gambrel roof dwelling three bays long and two bays deep with a long two story wing to the north, which was 19th century in date. Unusual features of the building included the exposed brick back of the fireplaces and a broad expanse of roof, similar to Saulsbury, but not as broad.

Inside the plan consisted to two rooms with corner fireplaces having raised paneling across the corner. The front room had three horizontal panels above the fireplace with three un-equal panels to each side. The fireplaces had segmental arches. In the northeast corner of the back room the stair was enclosed except for the lower steps, There was a vestibule and two unheated rooms on the second story. Originally the joists were exposed and beaded on the second story even though there was plaster below.

East of the house stood a fine little log smokehouse with steeply pitched pyramidal roof. It measured 10 feet square.

The site is important because it was the place where western peoples had lived for at least 200 years. The house which stood there in 1969 was 200 years old, give or take 20 years. It is a loss to the community.
