The Robert Lambdin house is a well-preserved story-and-a-half center hall frame house evidently raised during the second quarter of the nineteenth century. A few Greek Revival period features, such as the front door, the stair, and the mature cut-nail construction convincingly suggest this estimated date of build. The Lambdin house is one of group of early nineteenth-century houses in St. Michaels that provided modest shelter for middle class families during the antebellum period. Similar structures include 112 West Chestnut Street (T-272) and the center section of the Leonard Funeral Home (T-243). The house carries a Water Street address since there was a former door on the west gable end.

Robert Lambdin acquired "Lot 51" in 1839 from Elizabeth Jones, widow of Wrightson Jones (54/530). It is estimated that the house was erected shortly after this transfer, and the house remained in the Lambdin name until the early twentieth century when the Lambdin estate trustee sold the property to Joseph W. Dyott (146/48). Since then the corner property has had over a half-dozen ~~owners~~ owners.

## Lambdin house description

The Lambdin house, also known as the Cottage, is located on the southeast corner of the intersection of Water and Mulberry streets near the St. Michaels harbor in St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The story-and-a-half frame house faces north with the gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around 1825-1840, this center hall mortise and tenon frame house is supported by a minimal brick foundation, and it is covered by a steeply pitched asphalt shingle roof. The exterior is sheathed with plain weatherboards. Attached to the back of the main house is a shed roofed addition, and extending to the east is a shorter single-story kitchen.

The north (main) elevation is a three-bay facade with a center door covered by a gabled baffle entrance. The pyramidal panel front door is topped by a two-light transom. East of the entrance is a projecting tripartite bay window and west of the door is a single diamond-pane sash light. A pair of gabled dormers with diamond panes light the second floor, and a single brick chimney rises from the roof.

The west gable end, which faces Water Street, is marked by another tripartite diamond-pane sash window that lights the first floor, and two diamond-pane sash windows pierce the upper gable. The eave is flush and finished with a simple bargeboard.

Stretching across the back of the house is an enclosed shed addition that was formerly an open shed porch. A large gabled dormer flanked by two smaller gabled dormers light the second floor.

Largely covering the east gable end of the main house is a single-story, one-room plan kitchen covered by a simple gabled roof and sheathed with weatherboards. Attached to the east end of the kitchen is a screened-in porch.

The interior of the center hall house has been modified slightly through the years. The first floor newel post appears to have been replaced, but the rectangular balusters and oval-profile handrail are standard second quarter of the nineteenth-century features. The mantel in the parlor is a c. 1900 replacement, but the Greek Revival style mantel in the dining room dates from the mid nineteenth century. On the second floor the stairwell handrail has not been disturbed and retains its tapered newel post, rectangular balusters, and oval-profile handrail. Access into the crawl space above the second floor ceiling revealed a common rafter roof structure with the rafters lapped and fastened with cut nails.

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
