The J. Harrison Kemp house stands out as one of the largest and most architecturally distinctive dwellings sited along East Chestnut Street. The two-story, side hall-double pile main block is substantially larger than most nearby houses, and the towered addition doubled the space of the mid nineteenth-century dwelling. The three-story octagonal tower with "snowflake" sawn medallions is a rare architectural feature for St. Michaels. Although modified during the late nineteenth century, the interiors have remained largely intact within the main block.

Construction of the two-story frame house is attributed to John W. and Eleanora Blades around 1857. Eleanora Blades purchased Lots 69, 70, and 71 from Hugh A. Cooper in 1856 for \$333.33. Thirteen years later, the Blades couple sold the house to John T. Ford, formerly of Somerset County. In addition to Ford's maritime related activities, he was involved in real estate and is recognized as one of the early pioneers in the commercial fruit canning business in Talbot County. It is thought Ford enlarged the Blades house with the tower addition before he sold the property to John Thomas Harrison in 1870 for \$3500. Until recently, the property has been occupied by the Harrison and inter-related Kemp family.

The J. Harrison Kemp house stands at 108 East Chestnut Street near the intersection of the south gate of St. Mary's Square in St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The large two-story frame house faces north with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Erected around 1857, the two-story main house is supported by a minimal brick foundation and sheathed with plain weatherboards. The medium pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the east gable end is a two-story wing distinguished by a three-story octagonal tower. A small frame outbuilding stands east of the house.

The north (front) elevation of the main block is covered on the first floor by a hip roofed porch supported by turned posts with sawn brackets. The entrance bay is fixed in the east bay, and a six-panel front door is framed by three-light sidelights and a five-light transom. A three-part window fills the adjacent bay. The second floor is lighted by three six-over-six sash windows that are flanked by louvered shutters. The cornice is boxed and trimmed with bed molding.

The west gable end of the main block is marked by an asymmetrical fenestration with a single six-over-six sash window on each floor. The six-over-six sash window that lights the attic is centered between the pair of brick chimneys that protrude through the gable end. The gable end is flush and finished with a simple bargeboard.

The east gable end, on the other hand, is largely covered by a two-story, two-bay service wing. Construction evidence inside the house indicates the original gable end wing was originally a single story structure that was raised to a full two stories when the tower addition was attached. Along with the tower a single story hip roofed bay was added to the north facade of the old service wing. Paneled knee walls, a bracketed cornice, and single pane sash windows mark the bay along with a side door that is sheltered by a shed roofed hood. The second floor is lighted by a pair of single-pane sash windows, and a brick chimney protrudes through the roof. Distinguishing the northeast corner of the house is a three-story octagonal tower lighted on the two principal floors by single pane sash windows. The first floor knee wall is marked by decorative panels, and the third floor space is decorated with sawn snowflake-shaped medallions. The eight-sided tower roof has a bracketed cornice.

Extending from the back of the tower section is a two-story service wing finished in a conventional manner without unusual details. Likewise, the south side of the house is detailed in much the same manner as the other sides with less attention to decorative features.

The interior has been modified to provide service for at least three apartments. The main block is conventionally divided into a side hall/double pile plan. A heavily turned newel post and rectangular balusters support a circular profile handrail that ramps before each landing. The stringer is undecorated. Six-panel

doors with ogee inset moldings are framed by plain surrounds with undecorated corner blocks. The doors provide access to the two large rooms west of the hall. The front room is fitted with plain mid nineteenth-century mantel of plain pilasters, an undecorated frieze and a thick mantel shelf. A center partition dividing the two rooms is fitted with a pair of six-panel doors framed by plain surrounds with plain corner blocks. The back room mantel is identical to the front mantel, but the hearth retains a cast iron stove insert.

The second floor is divided into three rooms with four-panel doors providing access between spaces. The front (north) room features a plain mid nineteenth century mantel, while the back room was heated by a stove. In addition to the small room at the head of the stair, an enclosed closet stair provides access to the attic. Directly adjacent to the attic stair is a four-panel door that opens into the second floor of the service wing. The attic is partially finished with lath and plaster, but access into the attic of the eastern section indicates the former height of the service wing roof.

The first floor interior of the center section was partially reworked when the tower addition was attached. A large arched opening was cut in the east wall of the stair hall, and a reeded trim to frame the opening was applied. The hearth wall is distinguished by a turn of the century Colonial Revival mirrored mantel with semi-detached Corinthian columns under the molded shelf. The frieze is decorated with an applied tendril motif. The overmantel features a beveled mirror flanked by short Corinthian columns and topped by a classical entablature. Fixed to the right of the hearth wall is an enclosed winder stair with a paneled door to the stairway, and a beaded board door opens into the closet beneath the steps. The bay window along the front wall is trimmed with a reeded surround molding.

The tower room, located in the easternmost section of the house, is trimmed with late nineteenth-century woodwork that follows in the same manner as described for the middle section. Reeded surround moldings frame the window and door openings, and a standard Victorian mantel is fitted on the west wall of the tower room. Fixed in the rear section is another stair which rises in a more or less straight flight to the second floor of the towered addition.

The only surviving outbuilding is a single-story frame structure that stands next to the east porch. A diagonal lattice partition joins the outbuilding to the house. The squarish frame structure is sheathed with vertical boards and covered by a wood shingle roof. The door is located in the west gable front, while small boarded windows pierce the other sides.

SIGNIFICANCE

The J. Harrison Kemp house stands out as one of the largest and most architecturally distinctive dwelling sited along East Chestnut Street . The two-story side hall/double pile main block is substantially larger than most houses, and the towered addition doubled the space of the dwelling. The three-story tower with "snowflake" sawn medallions is a rare architectural feature for St. Michaels. Although modified during the late nineteenth century, the interiors have remained largely intact within the main block.

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

Construction of the two-story side hall/double pile frame dwelling is attributed to John W. and Eleanora Blades around 1857. Eleanora Blades purchased Lots 69, 70, 71 from Hugh A. Cooper, et al. in 1856 for \$333.33. (67/400) Thirteen years later, the Blades sold the house to John T. Ford, formerly of Somerset County. In addition to Ford's maritime related activites, he was involved in real estate and is recognized as one of the early pioneers in the commercial fruit canning business in Talbot County. It is thought that Ford enlarged the Blades house with the tower addition before he sold the property to John Thomas Harrison for \$3500 in 1870. (77/26) The property has remained in Harrison or the inter-related Kemp family until the present day.

NOTES: By a Chancery Court decision in 1812, John Dorgin acquired parts of Bentley Hay, Janes Progress, and The Beach which had been purchased by Thomas Sherwood from John Thompson and William Harrison (1791, 24/299 and 1785, 23/115. The land on which T589 is located is described: "All the land which formerly belonged to James Braddock lying to the southward of a line drawn from the East end of Chestnut Street on a cove of St. Michaels River straight with the street across the main road to Broad Creek." It is part of Janes Progress.

Lots #69, 70 71 East Chestnut Street

The land on the south side of East Chestnut Street in the town of St. Michaels is part of an ancient tract of land called "Jane's Progress." Owned by James Braddock, a mariner and representative at St. Micahels for the British firm of merchants, Gildart and Gawaith, it was his legacy to John Thompson when he died in 1782.

Thompson owned a great deal of land in the town of St. Michaels and since his primary interest lay in his holdings on the west side of town across Market Street (now Talbot), he sold the land on the south side of Chestnut Street to Hugh Sherwood.

John Dorgan, a blacksmith, was the next owner of this property, part of "Jane's Progress" and in 1808 he sold lots #69, 70 and 71 to Hugh Auld. Hugh Auld died in 1812 without ever having received a deed from John Dorgan and it was two years later in 1814, that Frances Auld, widow of Hugh, obtained title to her land. She died in 1821, intestate, and lots #69, 70, and 71 became the property of her legal heirs. For some twenty-five years the Auld family "possessed" this bit of land in St. Michaels.

On March 15, 1847, James Madison Hopkins of Boone County, Mississippi, for the consideration of eighty (\$80) dollars paid, conveyed to Hugh A. Cooper of Baltimore, Md. an undivided fourth part of "those lots or a part of a tract called "Jane's Progress" distinguished on the Plat of St. Michaels by #69, 70, 71 on Chestnut Street, Braddock Square, containing one-half acre." John D. Leland, Judge of The Circuit Court of Boone County was a witness to the acknowledgment signed by James Madison Hopkins, who was one of Frances Auld's grandsons. There is a little uncertainty here regarding the exact amount of Hopkins' share as in one place in the deed it is referred to as one-third.

On 23 December 1856, lots #69, 70 and 71 on the south side of East Chestnut Street were sold out of the Auld family by three of the grandchildren and their spouses. Hugh A. Cooper and Harriet A. his wife and Ann D. Auld, all of Baltimore City; and Moses Legg and Ann M. Legg his wife of Queen Anne county, for the consideration of three hundred thirty-three dollars thirty-three cents (\$333.33) sold their part of "Jane's Progress" to Eleanore Blades of St. Michaels.

Eleanore was born Eleanore Hambleton, a daughter of James C. and Elizabeth (Rathell) Hambleton of Peaneck. She married John W. Blades, a St. Michaels sailor, 11 June 1845. John W. Blades was a hard-working man and built a new house on the property for his family. Six of their eight children were born in this house.

On 7 December 1869 he and Eleanore sold the house and lots on East Chestnut Street, lots #69, 70, and 71 to Capt. John T. Ford for sixteen hundred dollars (\$1600.) One year before in 1860 the property was valued at fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.)

Capt. John T. Ford was a mariner who came to St. Michaels from Somerset County, Md. before 1850. Here he became a prominent businessman; a real estate dealer; and for a while the agent for the local steamboat line. He was one of the pioneers in the commercial fruit canning business in Talbot county. Twice married, his first wife was Martha, daughter of Thomas Dyott of St. Michaels and after her death he married a widow, Hester Wrightson Welby.

10 November 1870 - John T. Ford and Hester his wife to John T. Harrison of St. Michaels. For a consideration of thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3500) they conveyed lots #69, 70 and 71, containing one-half acre of land. This drastic increase in the selling price indicates added improvements to the lots and gives credence to the supposition that it was Capt. Ford who built the cannery on the lot adjoining the dwelling house. In 1875 John T. Harrison sold the lot with the canning house on it to T. E. Bell who erected another dwelling there.

John T. and Mary (King) Harrison's daughter Cordelia, married Charles A. Kemp. J. Harrison Kemp, son of Charles A. and Cordelia Kemp is now the owner of his grandfather's property.

108-110 E. Chestnut St., Saint Michaels

This 2-numbered house was probably built as one dwelling, although it appears to have been built in at least two stages of growth.


The west half of the building (108) is like a small town house - 3 bays wide and 2 rooms deep with double chimneys within the west gable. The entrance is located on the side nearest ~~the~~ ~~110~~ ~~to Chestnut~~ the wing, and instead of there being 2 windows on the 1st story, there is a single double-unit window, apparently a late after-thought. A one-story porch is also on the facade.

The wing (110) is interesting because of its irregularity, having a bay window, one side of which is the entrance, and a three-story octagonal on its east corner. These are added to an otherwise simple rectangular 3-bay long frame wing. ~~Each~~ each side of the tower has a window on 1st + 2nd stories while on the third story is a protruding ^{snow-flake} design of jig-saw work. It has a peaked roof with ball finial.




