DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Craig's Point is a four bay long one and one-half story frame dwelling standing on the south side of Reed's Creek and near the Choptank River. It is composed of three sections built on a brick foundation. The main part of the dwelling is the westerly portion composed of a three bay long portion with screen porch on the south with a small leanto room on its west side. The house originally had two front doors and two windows with 6/6 sash. The west window was lost when the smaller room was built. There are three dormers on each side of the 'A' roof and within each gable is a substantial brick chimney. On the west gable the back of the fireplace is exposed on the first story. Flanking it are two windows with 4/4 sash. On the west side of the small room is a chimney. The north side of the dwelling has only one door. On the east side of the above mentioned part is a one bay long addition the same height as the former. Its dormers and first story windows are lower, however. The kitchen wing is one story with a modern leanto on the north for utility. On its east gable is an exterior fireplace flanked by a door and window.

Inside, the floor plan consists of two rooms in the main part and one in each of the other parts. Originally, the stair was located in the northeast corner of the main part and was a small enclosed stair adjacent the off-center fireplace. It was removed around 1950 and a new stair added between the two rooms, beneath which was made two closets. The small office room adjacent the porch was converted into a bath. On the second story there were three rooms, one of which was used for the bath and part of the stair. Another also exists above the dining room wing. Trim around the second floor doors consists of a convex molding within a chanel, and a bead. The mantels throughout are original, the first story having columns, in the Greek Revival or Empire style and the second story having simpler mantels reminiscent of the Federal style.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Craig's Point is a good example of a vernacular structure dating from the second quarter of the nineteenth century which is well finished. It is well maintained. It is like several of the dwellings in the Neck District of Dorchester County, across the Great Choptank River.

It was owned in 1835 by Charles P. Craig, who probably built the present house. In 1895 Louisa Craig, widow of the aforesaid Charles sold the house and land to Samuel Dickerson, who in turn bequeathed it to his brother Overton. Around 1950 it was acquired by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Hundley. The second Mrs. Hundley was the former post-mistress of Trappe.




