DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Chlora's Point is located at the tip of Island Neck overlooking the vast expanse of Choptank River toward the Chesapeake Bay.

The house is a curious combination of materials, periods and style. It presently has a substantial east-west axis with wing on the south. Its entrance is located on the south facade west of the wing.

Apparently, the first house was the first story of the wing and was a brick one and one-half story dwelling built in the late 18th century. The first story walls remain of that building, and are essentially, relatively intact. Its chimneys have both been removed but the bases are still visible in the basement. A portion of this section extends into the present east-west axis.

The next portion of the building occurred when a three bay long, two and one-half story wing was added onto part of the south facade of the building, the section which is now the stair hall/entrance and the living room. The juncture of the two in such a manner must have been curious and undoubtedly needed a new section of roof constructed to shed the water away from the new wall. Most of this section remains with few alterations. It is three bays long and two and one-half storys tall with side entrance and two dormers on each side of the 'A' roof and a chimney on the west gable. Its original late Federal interior remains almost intact.

The third addition appears to have been an extension onto the brick section and the heightening of that entire wing, which was then the principal axis. This apparently occurred around the 1870 80 period.

Around 1920 a two story portico was added to the west end of the 1830 section and a large kitchen wing was added to the east, creating the major axis which exists today. Subsequently the second story of the portico was enclosed and the first story screened. Very recently a new room off the kitchen was built on the north. Other porches, open and closed, are situated on the north of the building.

North of the house is a small plank meat house covered with vertical planks.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, Chlora's Point is a curious combination of vernacular and stylish structures. The first two sections of the house were typical of vernacular buildings of their period. They have, however, been incorporated into a more pretentious dwelling than its transformation into a Talbot County country house by the 1920's alterations. Enough fabric of each building period remains to tell its story although most of that will be found within the house. Some of the details of the 1920 dwelling resemble details of Snug Harbor built in the same year.
