DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Bolton is located south of Claiborne on the Bay on the west side of Maryland Route 333, two miles north of Sherwood in Talbot County, Maryland. In its present form, it is a small dwelling composed of a three-bay, 2½-story brick house with a one-bay, one-story wing. In its original form, it was composed of the present 2½-story brick portion with two, telescoping brick wings.

The walls of the old part of the house are laid in Flemish bond on the east facade and common bond elsewhere. There are wide jack arches over all the openings in the brickwork. There is neither water table nor belt course, but there is a corbeled brick cornice. At one time there was a two-story porch on the east side. The outline of the original wing is visible in the north gable, above the new wing. The large interior chimney in the north gable contains two flues which are separated by an access way to the roof. The building has no cellar, only air holes to vent the space beneath.

The old part has a side entrance on both the east and the west, the former with a transom and the latter without. The windows on the first story have 9/6 sash; those on the second have 6/6, as do the two dormers in the attic. The rear facade has a window at landing level over the door.

Inside is only a stair hall and single room. Excepting the flooring on the first story, all the rooms of the building retain original woodwork. The open string stair ascends to the attic. Its spandrel has vertical beaded boards and a six-panel door beneath the landing. The balustrade has two rectangular balusters per step and a round handrail which ascends over the turned newels. The trim consists of a beaded board with three equally spaced rectangular grooves paralleling the bead.

In the living room the mantel has pilasters supporting a well-proportioned late Federal shelf. There are chair rail and baseboard, but no cornice. The other rooms have board partitions and period woodwork, all executed in simple design.

The present wing was built in the third quarter of the 20th century. A family graveyard is situated across the lane from the house. The acreage for this nomination includes the old house and graveyard only. A larger acreage was not chosen because of the newer house and outbuildings and nursery south of these which are not reflective of the original agricultural setting of this house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Bolton is significant as the largely unaltered remainder of a once larger farmhouse. Original woodwork remains throughout the house; nicely executed, it is simple but representative of the period of its construction. The home of the Kemp and Dawson families, prominent in this area, it reflected their prosperity during the first half of the 19th century. In its present state, it has been adaptively used as an office and guest house.

The tract called Bolton is interesting for its long tenure in the hands of one family. It was among vast acres patented to Edmond Webb in 1659 (4/336), on the Bay side of Talbot County. Webb's daughter married Robert Kemp, and by the will of her father, she inherited "Bolton" and "Bolton's Addition" in 1685. The property remained in the family over 200 years.

The Kemps, among the early Quaker families on the Eastern Shore, were instrumental in building the Bayside Meeting House. For the most part, they farmed their land and lived relatively uneventful lives.

There were five John Kemps, beginning with the son of Robert, who inherited a dwelling house and the surrounding lands in 1705 (1/193). In each case, the devise was from father to son. These five married into the Ball, Stevens, Wrightson, Troth and Lambdin families, all prominent Quakers in the county.

The first house at Bolton of which we have any description is listed in the 1798 Federal Tax assessment as a framed dwelling of one story, 36' x 18', with a framed kitchen adjoining. The old part of the present house was probably built by John Kemp and his wife, Sarah Troth, early in the 19th century.

The last John Kemp to occupy the brick house died in 1847, leaving the farm to his daughter, Mary Francis, who married Dr. Robert Dawson (Will 8/309). The Dawsons lived here and devised the property to their daughter, Agnes B. Dawson. In 1915 she sold the farm to John Battee, sold it in 1920 to John W. Hunter (184/293). The Hunters lived here for the next twenty-two years, and it is probable that they built the larger, more modern house that stands close by, but entirely separate from the old brick house.

A number of owners have occupied the house, while the Kemp homestead stood empty. Now, however, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Keller have bought the property and restored the brick house (460/1). It is used as a guest house and an office for Mr. Keller's landscaping business.

BEGINNING at a point on the north side of the south drive into the property about 700 feet west of Maryland Route 33, then following the drive west and as it curves north until it joins the north drive into the property about 500', then following the north drive west about 150', then moving north about 125' then east about 125', then south about 100' to the north drive, then following the north drive east about 100', then moving south about 250' to the point of beginning, containing about 1 3/4 acres.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Bolton is located south of Clairborne on the Bay. It is in its present form a small dwelling composed of a three bay, two and one-half story brick house with one bay, one story wing. In its original form it was composed of the present two and one-half story brick section with two telescoping two story wings.

The old part of the house has a side entrance on both side, one with a transom and the back without. The wall is laid in Flemish bond on its east facade and common bond elsewhere. It has 9/6 sash windows on the first story and 6/6 on the second and two dormers in the attic with 6/6 sash. There are wide jack archs over all the openings in the brickwork. There is neither water table nor belt course but there is a corbeled brick cornice. At one time there was a two story porch on the east side. The outline of the original wing is visible in the north gable, above the new wing. A large chimney is within the gable. It contains two flues which are seperated by an access way to the roof. There is no cellar, only air holes to vent the space beneath. The rear facade has a window at landing level over the back door.

Inside there is only a stair hall and single room. Excepting the first floor, all the other rooms of the building retain original woodwork. The open string stair ascends to the attic. Its spandrel has vertical beaded boards and a six panel door beneath the landing. The balustrade has two rectangular balusters per stop and a round handrail which ascends over the turned newels. The trim consists of a beaded board with three equally spaced rectangular grooves paralleling the bead.

In the living room the mantel has pilasters supporting a well proportion late Federal shelf. There are chair rail and base-board, but no cornice.

The other rooms have board partitions and period woodwork all executed in simple design.


