Originally constructed as a hotel in 1866 by George Haddaway, this three-story frame building had a shallow hipped roof and Italianate detailing and resembled the North Building #110-112 North Washington Street (T-40).

In 1897 the building was remodeled by its new owners, Nevius and Frampton, Incorporated, as a hardware store. The warehouse was also built at that time, and used to house the horse-drawn farm machinery they sold. Today the interior of the hardware store remains much as it was when first remodeled. Many of the accouterments of the turn-of-the-century store stand beside electric appliances and power tools.

Although the earlier hotels on the site must have had a very real place in the social and economic life of the young town, one cannot underestimate the impact of the hardware store that has been run continuously since 1899 by Simon Nevius and his sons Carl and Ronald. This is a rare heritage to cherish.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Nevius and Frampton Hardware building stands at the north east corner of North Washington and Goldsborough Streets. The store faces south.

This is a three story frame structure which is three bays wide on Goldsborough Street and three bays wide on North Washington Street. A two-story warehouse addition has been constructed on the east side; this addition is five bays wide on Goldsborough Street and two bays deep. After a fire in 1955 the present flat, built-up roof replaced the earlier hipped roof on the main portion of the building; the warehouse has a shallow gable roof. Grey aluminum siding has covered the wooden weatherboarding on the main portion of the building; the warehouse is covered with metal sheathing.

As it now stands the main entrance to the structure is found on Goldsborough Street in the store front that was added when the building was converted into a hardware store in 1897. The door is recessed and set between two plate-glass display windows, a common store front configuration. A bracketed cornice with pierced-work ornament surmounts the store front and is contemporary with it. Although it is no longer used, the original entrance door remains in the east bay. It has an overlight and sidelights. The door has glass in its upper portion and four panels beneath. This entrance led to a stair hall which is now used as an office.

Window openings remain only on the south and west facades; on the south they are positioned in a way which reflects the presence of the stair and narrow room at the head of the stair in the east bay. Windows on the west facade are evenly spaced, two to a bay. Sashes are six over six throughout. The trim is narrow, about one-and-a-half inches wide with a bead. Sills are unmolded and set flush with the wall surface. As seen in old photographs, shutters once flanked all windows.

At the time this building was converted to a store, the projecting window boxes were inserted in the west wall in the two northern bays. A side entrance shares the northern-most bay with the window box.

The warehouse is an extremely simple building whose only decorative feature is the pressed metal cornice at the floor line. In the second and fourth bays are wide garage doors. Windows with six over six sashes are found in remaining bays on both floors. The heavy timber structure framing which may be seen on the inside is typical of the type used in warehouses and factories before steel framing became widespread.

Before the fire in 1955 the building looked very much as it does in the old photograph, taken about 1906. There was a low hipped roof and bracketed cornice.

With its boxy, geometric form and emphasis on the roof line, this structure resembled its larger neighbor, the North Building, #110-112 North Washington (T-40)

This building was built in 1866 as a hotel. The main entrance lead to the lobby and stair. The present sales area was probably used as a restaurant, as noted in the Sanborn Map of 1885. The stair lead to two floors of small hotel rooms. They remain and are now used as storage. Their placement and size may be judged by the position of the windows on the west facade; there was one window in each room, except the corner room, and a central hall way. Interior details are quite simple; the stair being the most ornate element.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This structure is significant for its past and present uses and for the original appearance of the building, now much altered.

The structure was originally constructed as the "European House", it opened to guests on July 9, 1866 with George Haddaway as proprietor. At that time local newspapers reported that the earlier building standing on this site had been "torn down and moved away". The hostelry operated on this site for a number of years eventually receiving the name "Old Frame Hotel" from local residents.

In 1897 the structure was purchased by Messrs Nevius and Frampton, remodeled and the warehouse built. The enclosed photograph shows it, newly remodeled in about 1906. It has remained in the Nevius family until the present day, one of the town's best known retail establishments.

- L131/F361 In 1899, Simon Nevius and Charles L. Frampton, trading as Nevius and Frampton, bought this property from George F. Nickerson.
- L127/F338 He had previously (1897) acquired it at public sale due to a Chancery proceeding of Ellura Haddaway vs. George W. L. Haddaway.
- L72/F48 He paid \$1700.00. Mr. Haddaway had become the new proprietor
- \$3650.00 of the "Frame Hotel" in 1865 in a sale of all the real and personal possessions of Thomas K. Robson, who not only ran the hotel under the management of Thomas P. Wallaston, but also was owner and editor of the "Easton Star". Union soldiers were billeted here during the War and it was called the "Union Hotel" at this time. It was included in the estate of John Leeds Kerr, in 1847, with appurtenances, out houses and stables. He had run it as the "Union Tavern" under the direction of Ennals Roszell as innkeeper. The title was finally cleared and Mr. Robson became the owner in 1855.
