Constructed about 1895, the General E. L. F. Hardcastle House is a square hipped-roof frame building with a broad porch running across the front and side. It has unusual cobblestone decoration in the entrance pediment of the porch and a generous interior stair with delicate, closely spaced balusters. To the rear is a large carriage house topped by a cupola.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house standing on the east side of Aurora Street is the second building south of Foxley Hall. Behind the house, on Locust Lane is its carriage house, a two-story frame structure covered by a gable roof and topped by a cupola. The main house faces west.

The dwelling is a three bay square structure, two-and-a-half stories in height. A deep porch runs across the front and along the south side. Except for the porch the structure is symmetrical. The main entrance with double doors is in the center bay and leads to a broad hall which runs the width of the building. Windows are spaced one per bay through the house. Those in the first floor on either side of the entrance have eight over eight sashes and a cornice. On the second floor the central window is identical to those on the first floor. The other two are three-sided oriel windows supported by two ornamental brackets. In these two the sashes are made up of the interlockings muntins.

Maintaining the symmetry and regularity of the house the square hipped roof is pierced by two large gable dormers in each slope. They have a cornice and return and one over one sashes in the windows. The roof ends its sweep with flaring eaves.

Enclosed chimneys rise from the north and south walls and from the kitchen. They are straight sided, of brick, and extremely tall.

The generous front porch is quite simple; the gently sloping roof is supported by round columns. The railing has closely spaces square balusters. At the entrance the porch roof is treated with a pediment. In the tympanum is a geometric pattern made of small cobblestones embedded in plaster or stucco. This type of decoration is unusual on the Eastern Shore and more commonly used in areas with ample supplies of stone for building.

The interior stair is located in the north east corner of the house in a very large stair hall. It is an open-well, two run stair with a balustrade of slender balusters closely spaced three perttread. Mantles throughout the house are elaborate with shelves and applied wooden ornament. Hearths and surrounds are tiled.

Behind the house, on Locust is the carriage house. A two story structure, about forty feet by twenty-five feet. It is of frame covered with vertical siding. The gable roof is shingled and sports a cupola with louvered sides. Entrance doors and windows are irregularly placed. The carriage entrance with two double doors is on the street.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building is significant because it is an example of the type of dwelling built by a wealthy citizen around the turn of the century. It is also one of the largest houses on the two blocks of Aurora Street once called "Silk Stocking Row", because of its wealthy residents. It is one of the last houses built on the street and therefore represents the latest in the several styles of houses - beginning with the Federal style Foxley Hall - which were built there. Its carriage house is one of the largest in the town, and ornamented with its cupula, one of the most elaborate.

The house was constructed by General E. L. F. Hardcastle around 1895.

The East side of Aurora St., between Goldsborough and Dover St. was a part of the tract of land that Deborah Dickinson bought in 1795, when she built her lovely brick home, now known as "Foxley Hall". This house undoubtedly set the tone for the future homes that would later be built along this block and give it the name of "Silk Stocking Row".

One of these lots was bought by May R. Hardcastle. The wife of Edward B. Hardcastle in 1900 for \$896.00. They built this substantial house and occupied it for many years. Their heirs sold it in 1938 to Theodore and Marguerite Tobin. Dr. Tobin was a chiropractor who enjoyed a fine practice until he retired after the death of his wife and sold their home in 1975 to Florence Scrupski who is the present owner.






