DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This small rectangular brick house at the southeast corner of West and Vine Streets is two stories plus an attic in height. Its gable roof is edged with a wide cornice and return enriched with a bold cyma recta molding. The gable facade is two bays wide with the main entrance in the left bay.

The three windows in the front facade have six over six sashes secured in narrow beaded frames; second floor frames appear to be replacements. A rectangular opening in the attic is filled with louvers. The main entrance is surrounded by a transom light of three panes and sidelights with lower panels. Trimmed with deep bolection moldings, the front door has two tiers of panels, the longer being on the top. Side walls have windows evenly spaced in each of the two bays. Like the other openings, these have flat lintels, three brick courses in height and wider than the window opening. No shutters remain.

At the rear of the house is a one-bay wing with a very steep roof and widely overhanging eaves which are boxed and trimmed with a cyma recta molding. A tall end chimney is enclosed within the end wall. The window and door in this ell are treated similiarly to those in the main house.

The brick, a lovely bright orange color, is laid in one over seven common bond with narrow mortan joints. Lintels and window trim, painted white, contrast strongly.

This small brick house has belonged to James and Clara Stanley since 1921. They paid \$950.00 for the property. It had belonged to the Jump family from 1910 when it was sold at public sale to E. Percival Jump. It was then assigned to J. W. D. Jump. Isaac M. Turner had bought the property in 1901 from John T. Rathell for \$250.00. John Rathell took possession of the house and premises in 1887 for \$125.00. He bought it from Mary Jane and William H. Bush. She paid \$250.00 to George W. Turner and his wife Hester Ann in 1882. George Turner took title to the property in 1872 from Nathaniel and Adelia Tuthill and David and Harriett Avery when he paid \$300.00 for what had been a part of a tract of Charles Keilholtz.






