The Keeler Gallery occupies one of the oldest buildings standing in the central business district of St. Michaels. The two-story mid nineteenth-century frame house was evidently modified around 1900 with the rebuilding of the stair and the replacement of the Greek Revival mantels. Ther interior survives with a few period details such as the second floor newel post and a two-panel Greek Revival style door. The original exterior form of the house has been maintained with flush gable ends, a boxed cornice, and six-over-six sash windows.

Title work on this lot indicates the property was purchased by Samuel S. and Alexander Hambleton for \$50 in 1852 (64/233). Twenty-two years later the lot was partitioned and Alexander Hambleton retained the portion of the lot on which he dwelling stood. (79/486). After the turn of the century, the house and lot were sold to Barnet Beneman (135/395).

Keeler Gallery

The Keeler Gallery stands on the east side of Talbot Street in the center of the St. Michaels business district in Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, double-pile house faces west with the main gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Estimated to date to c. 1830-1850, the two-story, three-bay frame store is supported by a minimal brick foundation and covered with vinyl siding over weatherboards. The medium pitched roof has flush gable ends, a plain boxed cornice and a layer of asphalt shingles. Extending to the rear is two-story one-room plan kitchen wing.

The west (main) elevation is three bays across with the entrance located in the south bay. Adjacent six over six sash windows light the first and second floor. The side walls of the main block are simply finished, while the back wall is fully covered by the two-story rear wing. The rear corner of the house created by the service wing is filled with a two-story section covered with a shed roof.

The interior of the house has been remodeled on the first floor with a replacement brick mantels on the north wall of the front room and back rooms. The stair, rising in the back room, has a turn of the century square newel post, square balusters and a molded handrail. The early nineteenth-century handrail survives on the second floor with its turned newel post, rectangular balusters and circular-profile handrail. A Greek Revival style two-panel door opens into the back bedroom.

This is as far as I have been able to go with property sold by Samuel H Wrightson 1849-1856. At least one deed looks as though he sold the same land twice to different people. Thus far I have not found HOW he acquired the land in the first place. This property, Hope Hardware, the Mautz houses, and the IOOF all go back to Wrightson. It is all part of "Stopper" ("Joseph's Lot"), owned by Thomas Harrison, then to Joseph, then to Samuel or Edward. Wrightson married one of the daughters, and if he didn't get it from Samuel or Edward (I'm betting on Edward) he might have got it in a will. Will keep trying, but think the above is enough to date the house.






