The Hemsley Shop stands out as one of the smallest nineteenth-century store buildings to survive in the St. Michaels business district. The simple rectangular frame structure covered by a shed roof offers an interesting contrast to its immediate two- and three-story neighbors.

First mention of a shop building on this site is mentioned in 1859 when John T. Ford sold to Nicholas Orem the corner property bordering Talbot Street and Carpenter's Alley. The deed includes the clause, "...on which said lot stands a part of the Odd Fellows Hall built thereon subject to a sub-ground rent...and upon which also stands a shop built by Dr. John Miller and now owned or claimed by James B. Way."

The Hemsley Shop is located on the east side of Talbot Street in the center business district of St. Michaels, Maryland. The story-and-a-half, two-bay frame shop faces west.

Evidently erected during the second half of the nineteenth century, this story-and-a-half frame store is supported by a minimal brick foundation, sheathed with a layer of asbestos shingles, and covered by a shed roof.

The west (main) facade is a two-bay elevation with an entrance in the right (south bay). Directly adjacent to the door is a one-over-one sash window. A wooden awning, supported by iron rods, shelters the first floor openings. The upper wall surface is undistinguished.

The south side of the shop is pierced by two window openings in the westernmost bay. The first floor window is a modern replacement, while the second floor window remains shuttered. The north side of the shop is covered by the adjacent Odd Fellows Hall building.

The interior is divided into two unequal sized rooms. The front room, the larger of the two, is separated from the back room by a double-door partition. The doors are glazed and flanked by four-pane lights. Beaded board wainscoting survives in the front room, while built-in cupboards remain in the back room. At present there is no access into the upper section of the store building.

This deed takes in all the land on Talbot Street from the corner of Carpenters Alley south to the lot of T-573 (Keeler Gallery) and includes the IOOF Hall.



This is the earliest deed in which this property is identifiable. It appears to be a lot 11' to 21' deep with a frontage of 87' on Talbot Street. It includes part of the Odd Fellows lot, T-586 and T-587. It is definitely Harrison land - part of "Joseph's Lot" or "Stopper". It's early history is involved in the missing title of Samuel H Wrightson. From a study of the above deeds it would appear that Wrightson sold the FEE title while Samuel A Harrison sold the leasehold interest.
