Fox's Clothing Store is a pivotal commercial structure that distinguishes the St. Michaels business district. Marking the prominent corner of Talbot Street and Canton Alley, the mid nineteenth-century store building retains a well preserved Victorian store front as well as its overall exterior appearance. The second floor porch incorporated in the rear wing is exceptionally unusual with its robust turned balusters.

The chain-of-title for the Talbot Street property suggests that the current two-story frame building was erected in 1876, shortly after a mortgage was executed to the Workingman's Building and Loan Association of St. Michaels for \$600. Charles A. Smithman and John H. McQuay, the joint owners of the property, borrowed \$600 in 1875, and then secured the mortgage with the improved lot in 1878. Since Charles Smithman married John H. McQuay's daughter, Elizabeth, the property passed to Smithman's daughter, Augusta, on the death of Charles. Augusta Smithman sold the corner house to T. Hughlett Henry in 1913. However, Augusta reestablished her family's ownership on the site by purchasing the property back in 1922.

Fox's Clothing Store stands on the southeast corner of Talbot Street and Canton Alley in the central business district of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story frame store building faces east with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Probably built in 1876, the three-bay frame store rests on a minimal brick foundation and is sheathed with vinyl siding. The medium pitched roof, covered by a layer of seamed tin, is finished with boxed cornices and flush gable ends. Attached to the back of the house is a two-story, four-bay service wing.

The east (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with a Victorian store front of plate glass windows and a recessed entrance that occupy the northern two bays. Stretching across the upper level of the display windows is a bracketed cornice. A door that was formerly located in the southernmost bay has been covered over. The second floor is lighted by three unevenly spaced six-over-six sash windows that are flanked by louvered aluminum shutters.

The north gable end is marked by two six-over-six sash windows that light the second floor, while single-pane sash windows illuminate the third floor. Both pairs of windows are located to each side of the interior end brick stove stack that pierces the roofline. The south gable end is a plain wall surface aside from the two single-pane sash that light the third floor.

The west side of the main block is largely covered by the two-story, four-bay rear wing. A brick stove stack rises between the second and third bays. The three eastern bays on the north side are filled with six-over-six sash windows, while the fourth bay is distinguished by a second floor porch. The most notable feature of the porch is the robust turned baluster handrail that stretches between the post and the porch wall. The gable end of the wing is marked by a door opening on the first floor and four-over-four sash window on the second. The gable end is flush.

The commercial space on the first floor has been reworked and access was not gained to the balance of the building.

SIGNIFICANCE

Fox's Clothing Store is a pivotal commercial structure that distinguishes the St. Michaels business district. Marking the prominent corner of Talbot Street and Canton Alley, the mid-nineteenth-century store building retains a well preserved Victorian store front as well as its overall period exterior appearance. The second floor porch incorporated in the rear wing is exceptionally unusual with its robust turned balusters.

STORY AND SUPPORT

The chain-of-title for this corner property fronting Talbot Street suggests that the current two-story frame building was erected in 1876, shortly after a mortgage was executed to the Workingman's Building and Loan Association of St. Michaels for \$600.(80/304) Charles A. Smithman and John H. McQuay, the joint owners of the property, borrowed \$600 in 1875 and then secured the mortgage with the improved lot in 1878.(85/452) The house is located on the 1877 county atlas. Since Charles Smithman married John H. McQuay's daughter, Elizabeth, the property passed to the Smithman's daughter, Augusta, on the death of Charles. Augusta Smithman sold the corner house to T. Hughlett Henry in 1913.(165/159)

However, Augusta reestablished her family's ownership of the site by purchasing the property back in 1922.(192/205)

It does not come within 22 feet of the Main Road because the Church Land was in the way. The piece of Church land went from John Merchant to James Lambdin by 1801, 29/43 and from the Vestry to John Merchant by 1800, (un-numbered)/62.

The land was included in Braddock's land "south of the Main Road" that Thompson bought from James Wignal in 1784, 21/413; that Wignal had bought from Thompson in 1784, 21/417; and which Thompson had acquired by James Braddock's will in 1782. It was purchased by James Braddock from George Gleave in 1775-1776.

(20/484 and 20/529) Gleave was a Tory and went back to England.

George Gleave bought the property from James Hewes (1775, 20/474). Hewes got it by a quit-claim type of deed from Thomas Harrison in 1768, 19/510. As close as the lot is to the Church Land (Jane's Progress) it could have been in that tract although it is more likely part of Chance. If Chance, Hewes would have bought it from George Taylor in 1740. Edward Elliott picked up Chance as a resurvey in 1735, originally laid out for James Bellass in 1664.


