The Mills stands on the east side of Water Street backing up to the St. Michaels harbor. Although some modifications such as the replacement of sash windows have been introduced to the exterior, the house retains its late nineteenth-century character with the sidelighted entrance and bracketed eaves. The interior contains a period stair as well as some original doors, door and window surrounds, and baseboards.

Talbot County land records suggest the Mills house was erected around 1871-1872 by Giles W. Jump and his wife, Martha, after their purchase of the Water Street lot in 1871. The couple purchased the lot from John T. and Mary Caulk for \$550, and then sold the improved lot the next year to Georgia F. Smith for \$700. A structure is located at this site on the 1877 town map. Georgia Smith held the title to the property until 1898, when the house was purchased by Robert L. Baynard. The Baynard family retained ownership until 1966. Ladson A. and Christina Mills acquired title to the harbor front property in 1979.

The Mills house stands at 405 Water Street in the central residential district of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, side hall-parlor frame house is faces west with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1871-72, the two-story, three-bay frame house is supported by a minimal brick foundation and sheathed with abestos shingles. The medium pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Extending from the south gable end of the main house is a shorter two-story, two-bay frame wing built at the same time as the main block. An even shorter two-story service wing extends to the rear.

The west (main) facade is an asymmetrical three-bay elevation with a side entrance and flanking single-pane sash windows with louvered shutters. The four-panel front door is framed by multi-pane sidelights and a three-light transom. A single bay stoop shelters the front door. The second floor is lighted by three evenly spaced single-pane sash windows. Decorative brackets trim the base of the roof. The adjacent two-bay wing is finished in a consistent manner with the main block with brackets that trim the cornice and single-pane sash windows that light the first and second floors.

The north gable end is a blank wall with slightly extended eaves, whereas the south end wall is marked by an exterior brick chimney that was added during the twentieth century. The east side of the house follows in the same manner as the rest of the building. A screened-in porch covers the entire first floor.

The first floor interior of the main house follows a side hall parlor plan. The stair rises against the south wall of the hall, and it is distinguished by a large turned newel post, turned balusters, and a simply molded handrail. The perimeters of the hall and parlor are fitted with ogee molded baseboard. Four-panel doors framed by simply molded surrounds provide access between rooms. There is no east wall to allow for a large dining room. The kitchen is a later addition.

The second floor is finished in a straightforward manner without unusual details. A small room is located at the head of the stair. Access into the attic through a drop stair provided construction evidence that indicated the front two sections of the house were built at the same time.

A structure is located at this site on the 1877 town map. Georgia Smith held title to the property until 1898, when the house was transferred to Robert L. Baynard (129/291). The Baynard family retained ownership until 1966.


