Construction of the St. Michaels Pottery Warehouse building was accomplished in two stages with the south end as an addition to the two-story, gable-front section. The original structure was evidently erected around 1880 since there is no improvement located on this lot on the 1877 town map. The northern half of the ell-shaped building appears on the 1891 and 1901 Sanborn Insurance maps. During the period between 1867 and 1903, the property was held by William J. Fairbank, who operated a coal and wood yard between this building and the adjacent grocery store to the south. (See T-602) It was probably after the sale of the property in 1903 that southern half of the structure was attached.

The St. Michaels Pottery Warehouse is located in a two-story ell-shaped frame structure standing at 407 Talbot Street in the southern commercial district of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story structure faces west with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1880, the two-story, two-part ell-shaped frame shop is supported by a minimal brick foundation and sheathed with asbestos shingles. The asphalt shingle roof has a steep pitch and the eaves are slightly extended beyond the wall surfaces. This structure was erected in two distinct periods with the northern half predating the southern section by slightly more than a decade.

The west (main) facade is an asymmetrical elevation with two entrances. The recessed portion of the ell plan is partially filled with a Tuscan columned porch. The cornice of the porch roof is marked by a row of heavy dentils. A Victorian paneled door is framed by two-light sidelights and a two-light transom. A paired single-pane sash window lights the first floor south of the entrance. The second floor is lighted by two single-pane sash windows. The second entrance is fixed in the projecting portion of the ell-shaped main block. This commercial Victorian front has not changed significantly and is distinguished by a by a recessed entrance and flanking plate glass display windows. The apron below each window are decorated with incised carving. A heavy bracketed cornice stretches mid-level between floors. The second floor is lighted by three four-over-four sash windows.

The north side of the main block is marked by an asymmetrical arrangement of boarded-over openings and late nineteenth-century sash windows. To the rear, the single-story shed additions have been attached to both sections.

The interiors have been largely reworked. A late nineteenth-century stair is fixed in the south room along with a reused Victorian mantel. A second, late nineteenth-century stair was added in the north room. Most original period features have been covered over or removed.

Standing behind the house is a gable-front frame outbuilding sheathed with board and batten siding and covered by a tin roof. The lightly framed barn building is in serious structural condition since it is supported by iron cables.

The St. Michaels Pottery Warehouse building is an interesting Talbot Street structure for several reasons. The ell-shaped building offers a variation from other houses nearby, and the period exterior features such as the intact Victorian storefront and principal entrance are unusual in St. Michaels. Few alterations outside a reduction in the size of the front porch have been made to the exterior.

Construction of this building was accomplished in two stages with the south end as an addition to the two-story, gable-front section. The original structure was evidently erected around 1880 since there is no improvement located at this site on the 1877 town map. The northern half of the ell-shaped building appears on the 1891 and 1901 Sanborn Insurance maps. During the period between 1867 and 1903, the property was held by William J. Fairbank, who operated a coal and wood yard between this building and his adjacent grocery to the south. It was probably after the sale of the property in 1903 that the southern half of the structure was attached.

NOTES At this sale Elizabeth bought all of her husband's property. He had died shortly before, leaving a debt of over p10,000. The real estate included a large farm on Broad Creek known as "Beverly", the brick hotel on the corner of Mulberry and Talbot Streets, and other lots among which were two listed as "unimproved". Wrightson Jones was one of the ship builders of St. Michaels. His principle yard was at "Beverly" but he also owned lot number 51 at the foot of Mulberry Street (T-253) where Robert Lambdin had his boat building establishment after 1839.

NOTES A lot distinguished on the plat of the town as 3/4 of lot 21, lot 22, and lot 23 (this lot) in Braddock's Square. Part of "The Pentagon" (!) Samuel Tenant obtained a patent for nine lots which he claimed were "abandoned" or "escheated". He apparently discovered them during his survey of the new "Town of St. Michaels" between 1804 and 1806. His patent, at first called "The Polygon", later "Pentagon", was taken out in 1809. The last recorded owner of lot number 23 was Captain James Wignal.

NOTES The sale included lots 22 and 23, although they are not mentioned by number. The lot of ground sold was 120 feet square. This is the last appearance of the property in the records until the lot is mentioned by number in Samuel Tenant's patent. Although Wignal sold several individual lots as late as 1789, it would appear that he never disposed of 22 and 23 and Samuel Tenant was able to convince the Land Office at Annapolis that they had been abandoned. NOTES There were two lots, (nos. 22 and 23) included in the sale. The selling price is quite low, considering the location on the main road. It is the only instance in which Braddock did not mention the lot numbers in the deed, although the land is said to be in "Jane's Progress". The plat of Braddock's "Town of St. Michaels" had not been (and never was) recorded and officially, numbered lots in a "town" did not exist. Perhaps Dorgan, looking forward to the imposing of a tax structure, felt that a square of rural property would be valued less than a "town lot".

The lot was located on the main road - called by Braddock - Market Street within the area of his town which he divided into numbered lots.





SANBORN - 1901

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
