The chain-of-title for this North Talbot Street lot indicates that the extant two-story brick building that now houses the St. Michaels Inn was erected as connected houses for Emily DeBeet and Ellen Jane Edgar, both of whom purchased adjacent lots for \$830 in 1874. The \$830 purchase price of the lots would suggest that the former owners who operated the Dodson and White brickyard had erected the duplex on speculation or by an agreement with the future grantees. Emily DeBeet bought the southern half of the structure, while Ellen Jane Edgar purchased the north half. Eight years later, in 1882, Emily DeBeet bought the north half as well.

Although the building has been extensively reworked as a restaurant, the brick structure is the only nineteenth-century dwelling in St. Michaels erected as a duplex. Unlike most buildings in town, the rectangular main block is covered by a hip roof, and it is marked by two door openings on the principal (east) elevation. In conversion to a restaurant and inn, the interior has been stripped of any original finish features. The building, however, does contribute to the architectural diversity of town and the nineteenth-century character of North Talbot Street.

The DeBeet-Edgar house, now called the St. Michaels Inn, stands on the west side of North Talbot Street in St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, six-bay brick structure faces east with the hip roof oriented along a north/south axis.

Built around 1874, the two-story six-course common bond brick duplex is six bays across by two room deep. The low pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles, and a brick stack rises through the center portion of the building. A single story brick addition extends to the south, and a large modern addition stretches westward to house restaurant facilities.

The east (main) elevation of the main block is a symmetrical six-bay facade. The outer two bays on the first floor are filled with glazed doors, while the center four bays are filled with evenly spaced six-over-six sash windows framed by louvered shutters. The openings are topped by jack arches. The second floor is lighted by six evenly spaced six-over-six sash windows that are also highlighted by jack arches and shutters. Trimming the perimeter of the roof is a corbelled brick cornice.

Attached to the south side of the building is a single-story brick addition that contains the principal entrance to the restaurant. It is lighted by a six-over-nine sash window. An exterior stair leads to a door in the the second floor wall. The north side of the main block is detailed with similar features.

The west (rear) elevation is covered largely by the modern restaurant service wing.

The mid nineteenth-century features have been completely stripped from the various rooms. Bare brick walls and exposed joists characterize the rough interior surfaces. The second floor has been converted into rooms with new materials as well.

The DeBeet-Edgar house, or the St. Michaels Inn, is a substantial two-story, six-bay late nineteenth-century brick structure that stands on the northern fringe of the historic district. Although the building has been extensively reworked as a restaurant, the brick structure is the only nineteenth-century dwelling in St. Michaels erected as a duplex. Unlike most buildings in town, the rectangular main block is covered by a hip roof and is marked by two door openings on the principal elevation. In conversion to a restaurant and inn, the interior has been stripped of any original finish features. The building does, however, contribute to the architectural diversity of town and the nineteenth-century character of North Talbot Street.

### HISTORY AND SUPPORT

The chain-of-title for this North Talbot Street lot indicates that the two-story brick building was erected as connected houses for Emily DeBeet and Ellen Jane Edgar both of whom purchased adjacent lots for \$830 in 1874. (See 80/259 and 80/199) The \$830 purchase price of the lots would suggest that the former owners who operated the Dodson and White brickyard had erected the duplex on speculation or by an agreement with the future grantees. Emily DeBeet purchased the southern half of the structure, while Ellen Jane Edgar purchased the north half. Eight years later in 1882, Emily DeBeet bought the north half of the duplex. (95/24) Carroll Edgar, executor for Emily DeBeet, sold the property in 1917.
