Named for the Seymour family who owned this property from 1898 to 1952, this house evidently dates to the third quarter of the nineteenth century. The title research indicates the house was erected during the ownership of Samuel S. Harrison, Sr., who owned the house and lot directly north, or his children M. Olivia Burns, Elizabeth F. Gray, and Samuel S. Harrison, Jr. The property remained in family hands until Joseph J. Seymour acquired title in 1898 for \$450.

The Seymour house is a modest two-story, two-part stepped frame house that stands in a row of contemporary mid to late nineteenth-century dwellings on St. Mary's Square. The stepped profile of the structure is common for the period and is repeated throughout St. Michaels. Although the house has been remodeled with the addition of artificial siding and a colonial style entrance, it contributes to the period character of St. Mary's Square.

The Joseph J. Seymour house is located at 404 St. Mary's Square in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story frame house faces east with the gable oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1870, the two-story, two-bay house is supported by a minimal brick foundation, and it is sheathed with a layer of aluminum siding. Attached to the south gable end of the main block is a slightly shorter two-story, two-bay wing. Both sections are covered with medium pitched, asphalt shingle gable roofs.

The east elevation of the main block is an asymmetrical two-bay facade with a side entrance and a flanking six-over-six sash window. The replacement front door is topped by a three-light transom and framed by a classical pedimented surround. Louvered shutters flank the adjacent window. The second floor is lighted by two unevenly spaced six-over-six sash windows, also hung with louvered shutters.

Piercing the north gable end is an interior end chimney. The eaves are slightly extended. To the south the slightly shorter two-story wing appears contemporary with the main block. Pairs of six-over-six sash windows light each floor, and an interior end chimney protrudes through the south gable end.

The balance of the exterior is finished in a like manner, and the interior was not seen.

to honor Braddock's deeds and plat, the surveyor (Samuel Tennant) made the lots
100 feet deep! As far as I know, this has never been contested...but someday it
might wind up in court.


