Built during the second half of the nineteenth century in at least two stages, the oldest part of this house probably dates from the ownership of Isabel Keithley, who purchased this property initially in 1859. With the transfer price at \$130 it seems probable that the lot was not improved by a substantial dwelling. Nine years later, Isabel, who had married Josiah Thomas, transferred title to the property to Duncan DeBeet for \$500, who then sold the house back to the Thomases two years later. This short-term transfer may have been due to a temporary loan that was satisfied in two years. Finally in 1886, James Benson, the executor of the estate of Josiah Thomas, sold the Mulberry Street house to Amelia A. Kirby. During the same year, a short notice appeared in The Eastern Star on November 2 stating that

Work has been begun by Mr. John R. Kirby on his recent purchase on Mulberry street. The shed kitchen has been removed and the house moved ten feet west giving good space for a new addition on the east side to be shortly erected.

The property was not sold out of the Kirby family until 1925.

The John R. Kirby house is a large two-story frame dwelling built during the prosperous period in St. Michaels that surrounded the Civil War. The ell-shaped main house carries notable features including a turned post porch, a sidelighted main entrance, and two-over-two sash windows. The house stands on the south side of Mulberry Street in a row of contemporary dwellings.

The John R. Kirby house is located at 204 Mulberry Street in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story ell-shaped frame dwelling faces north with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around 1870, the two-story, ell-shaped frame dwelling is supported by a low brick foundation, and it is sheathed with a combination of German and aluminum siding. A layer of asphalt shingles covers the steeply pitched gable roof. An article in The Easton Star, printed on November 3, 1886, states that improvements were being made to the house which involved moving the existing house west ten feet in order to provide space for an east end addition.

The north (main) elevation is an asymmetrical five-bay elevation with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. The windows retain their louvered shutters. The front door is framed by three-light sidelights and a four-light transom. Stretching across the center three bays is a turned post, hip roofed front porch with square handrails between the posts. The porch roof is covered with an old layer of seamed tin. Lighting the second floor are five unevenly spaced two-over-two sash windows, also hung with their louvered shutters. A round arched two-over-two sash window pierces the upper gable front. The base of the roof is trimmed with a boxed cornice and slightly extended eaves.

Narrow brick stove chimneys rise through the center of the ell and the east gable end.

The interior was not seen.

Perhaps the sale was honoring a previous agreement. At any rate, payment was made in specie -- a good price for a lot that was not waterfront and probably unimproved.


