Credit for erecting this small, two-story, two-bay frame house is attributed to Mary E. Caulk, who purchased this sliver of a lot in 1872 from Dawson Caulk. With this transfer, the 60' wide Lot 54 was subdivided into two 30' lots that fronted the street and the harbor. Mary E. Caulk retained ownership of the house and lot until 1920, when the property was transferred to Elizabeth and George N. Pratt.

The Mary Caulk house represents the smallest of the mid to late nineteenth century house types standing in St. Michaels. The two-story, two-bay frame structure has been remodeled, but its form and scale relate to the adjacent buildings on Water Street thereby contributing to the street's cohesive historic nature.

The Mary Caulk house is a two-story, two-bay frame dwelling that stands at 407 Water Street in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The house faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1873, the two-story, two-bay frame house rests on a low brick foundation, and it is sheathed with asbestos shingles. The medium pitched asphalt shingle roof is finished with a plain boxed cornice and flush gable ends. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story wing which extends farther east by a single story addition.

The west (main) elevation is an asymmetrical two-bay facade with a side entrance and an adjacent six-over-six sash window. The partially glazed front door, topped by a three-light transom, is sheltered by a single bay gable roofed porch. The window is flanked by board shutters. A pair of six-over-six sash windows also hung with board shutters light the second floor.

The north wall is a plain asbestos shingled wall surface aside from a single six-over-six sash window on the first floor, and a small louvered vent in the upper gable. The south gable end is partially covered by a car-port addition.

The interior was not seen.


