The Harper cottage is a small single story wood shingled frame house that stands in the center of St. Michaels on the north side of Grace Street. Local town tradition relates that this building was a garage originally and it was moved to this site when it was converted to a house. Detailed with early twentieth century features, such as the pedimented porch and six-over-six sash windows, this small house contributes to the historic character of Grace Street.

Older residents recall this property under the ownership of William G. and Katie Mae Harper. Harper family interest in the property was established in 1943 when the house and lot were purchased by William B. and T. Walter Harper.

The Harper cottage is located at 101 Grace Street in the center of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The single story frame dwelling faces south with the principal gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Apparently this small house was formerly a garage and moved to this site with intentions of converting it into a house. Dating to around 1910, the structure is supported by a minimal foundation that is covered with imitation rusticated block metal sheets. Sheathed with a layer of wood shingles the gable front roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The south (main) elevation is a basically symmetrical facade with a center entrance sheltered by a gable front porch supported on square posts. The entrance is filled with a partially glazed door. The door is flanked by six-over-six sash windows. A small pointed arch window marks the gable front wall above the entrance, and the eaves to the roof are slightly extended. An interior brick stack rises through the east side of the main block.

The interior was not seen.

### HISTORY AND SUPPORT

At the moment it is not exactly certain when the former garage was moved to Grace Street and converted into a house, but the exterior architectural details suggest the remodeling of the structure occurred during the early to mid twentieth century. The land was inherited by Theron Q. Bruff from his father, Thomas Bruff.

Thomas Bruff, Sr. 1772-1857 was the oldest of six children of John Bruff, Joiner-Wheelwright. He inherited the Bruff property on Talbot and Grace Streets.

In June, 1895 a fire destroyed the buildings to the north of this lot (T-609, T-610) and a large empty warehouse (known locally as "The Ark") behind the structures on Talbot Street. This was probably the storehouse of Nicholas Orem mentioned in deed 1856, 67/303.

FROM: James Braddock and John Thompson PRICE:

TO: John Bruff

NOTES Between 1781 and 1790, John Bruff wheelwright and joiner, bought three parcels from James Braddock and John Thompson totaling 145 feet on the "main road or Market Street". These have not been definitely located, but the distance on Talbot Street can adequately cover lots from Grace Street to the Sears property. The Town Survey of 1804 notes that the property lines in this area cannot be shown because of problems with the configuration of the lots. The name "Bruff" can be made out in pencil on the original plat of the town in this section. The following deeds are the purchases made by John Bruff on the Main Road:


1781, 21/223 James Braddock to John Bruff p180 sp 60' x 60'

1790, 24/52 John Thompson to John Bruff p15 cm 50' x 60'(on road)

and another 60'x 25'(on road)

The deeds give the original tracts as "Chance" and/or "Jane's Progress".

Note: John Bruff also bought a lot 297' x 280' about 90 feet back from the main road behind the road frontage lots. (From John Thompson, 1791, 24/276)
