The old Methodist Protestant parsonage, also known as the Frank S. Orem house, is a distinctive two-and-a-half story ell-shaped frame dwelling that defines the west end of West Chestnut Street. The projecting pavilion is a strong architectural element, and the two-story porch that fills the front corner to shelter the front entrance is a common features for St. Michaels houses. In its well preserved condition the old parsonage contributes significantly to the streetscape.

The trustees of the Methodist Protestant church of St. Michaels acquired this West Chestnut Street lot from Mary L. and William P. L. Shaeffer of Philadelphia in 1871, and it is assumed the church financed the construction of this dwelling shortly afterwards for their minister's use. The St. Michaels & Bayside Methodist Protestant church sold the property sixteen years later for \$600 to Frank S. Orem.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The old Methodist Protestant parsonage is located at 115 West Chestnut Street on the western edge of St. Michaels, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story frame house faces south with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Built around 1875, the two-and-a-half story, ell-shaped frame dwelling is supported by a low brick foundation, and it is sheathed by a layer of asbestos shingles. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A shorter two-story service wing extends to the rear.

The south (main) elevation is an asymmetrical three-bay facade with a recessed entrance wall sheltered by a two-story chamfered post porch. Surviving on each floor on sawn baluster handrails and decorative corner brackets. The entrance is filled with a partially glazed door, and a two-over-two sash window fills the adjacent bay to the east. West of the front door is a projecting two-story pavilion filled with paired two-over-two sash windows. A smaller two-over-two sash window pierces the upper gable to light the attic.

The interior was not seen.

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HISTORY AND SUPPORT

The trustees of the Methodist Protestant church of St. Michaels acquired this West Chestnut Street lot from Mary L. and William P. L. Shaeffer of Philadelphia in 1871, and it is assumed the church financed the construction of this dwelling shortly afterwards for their minister's use. The St. Michaels & Bayside Methodist Protestant church sold the lot sixteen years later for \$600 to Frank S. Orem.(111/39) Due to the relatively low price for the time and the late nineteenth century character of the front block, Frank Orem could have substantially enlarged the house after his purchase of the property in 1887.

James Benson bought 12 feet on the west side of this lot from Samuel Grace for an alley running from Chestnut to Grace Street in 1852. From the metes and bounds of the deed, the "Parsonage Alley" ran east and west.

Bought by James Braddock in 1775-76 (20/484, 529), it went to John Thompson by Braddock's will in 1782.




