The Thomas Mills house is reported to have been erected around 1900 as a two-story, two-bay, one-room plan rental dwelling. Sometime later the initial house was enlarged by moving a two-story, one-room plan house next to the existing dwelling in an effort to create a three-bay, two-room plan structure. The single-story kitchen is reported to have been attached by Thomas Mills, who purchased the property during the early to mid twentieth century. Similar to many Bellevue community dwellings, the house is a very plain, utilitarian structure that reflects the nature of black family housing in a company owned watermens' village around the turn of the twentieth century.

The Thomas Mills house stands on the southwest corner of the intersection of Gates and Dawson streets in the center of Bellevue, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame dwelling faces northwest with the principal gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Built around 1900, the two-story, three-bay main block is reported to have been built in two sections by joining another one-room plan house to the existing two-story, two-bay dwelling. The house is supported on a low brick foundation, and it is covered with aluminum siding. The medium pitched roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the house is a single-story kitchen wing.

The northwest (main) facade is a slightly uneven three-bay elevation with a center entrance and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The front door is partially glazed. Lighting the second floor are three unevenly spaced six-over-six sash windows. The eave to the roof is extended slightly with sloped soffits.

The northeast gable end is a blind wall surface with a stove flue protruding at the first floor level. The southwest gable end, on the other hand, is pierced by single six-over-six sash windows on each floor. The edge of the roof is slightly extended beyond the wall surface.

The southeast (rear) elevation is partially covered by the single story kitchen wing. A partially glazed side door allows access from the east, and an exterior block stack rises against the south end.

The interior was not seen.


