The James Henry Moaney house is a plain two-story, three-bay frame dwelling that stands at the northern end of Copperville, a small black-owned community in the vicinity of Tunis Mills. Reported by the current owner, Gertrude Moaney Roberts, to have been erected by her father around 1920, the house follows the style of dwelling erected by small black landholders from 1890 to the first World War. A frame privy and a small barn are outbuildings that were once common to these rural villages, but most examples have been lost.

The James Henry Moaney house is located on the east side of Copperville Road in the small black-owned community of Copperville, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame house faces northwest with the gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Reported to have been built around 1920, this two-story, three-bay frame house is supported on a minimal masonry foundation, and the house is currently being resheathed with vinyl siding over asbestos shingles. The steeply pitched asphalt roof is finished with extended eaves and short returns. Standing in the backyard is a privy and a small barn.

The northwest (main) elevation is a symmetrical three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. The front door is a replacement. Sheltering the first floor is a shed roof screened porch. The second floor is lighted by a pair of two-over-two sash windows.

The northeast and southwest gable end are similar with pairs of two-over-two sash windows illuminating each floor on each side of interior end brick stove flue chimneys. The eaves of the roof are slightly extended and finished at the base with short returns.

Covering a large part of the rear (southeast) side of the main block is a two-story, two-bay kitchen wing with a shed roof porch off the south side. An interior end brick stack rises through the gable end, and two-over-two sash windows pierce the first and second floor walls.

The interior was not seen.


