The Harry Goldsborough house represents an alternative type of house normally found in black-owned villages dating to the nineteenth century. Instead of the common two-story, three-bay gable roof house, this two-story, two-bay dwelling was built with its gable facing front. A extension of the roof in back allowed for covering the slightly shorter two-story kitchen. The house was moved to this site within the last twenty to thirty years, but its original location is uncertain.

The Harry Goldsborough house is located on the east side of Copperville Road in the center of the small black-owned village of Copperville, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, two-bay frame house faces southwest with the gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Built around 1900, this two-story, two-bay frame dwelling was moved to this location within the last thirty years. Supported on a block pier foundation, the house is clad with a layer of asphalt shingles. The steeply pitched gable roof, built with extended eaves and sloped soffits, is covered with asphalt shingles as well. Attached to the back of the house is a shorter two-story, one-room plan kitchen wing.

The southwest (main) elevation is a gable front facade with a side entrance and flanking six-over-six sash window. The second floor is lighted by two evenly spaced six-over-six sash windows, and the eave is slightly extended beyond the wall surface.

The northwest side elevation is marked by a single six-over-six sash window on the second floor, whereas the southeast side is defined by six-over-six sash windows on both floors. Rising through the north gable end is an interior end concrete block stove flue chimney.

The northeast (rear) elevation is largely covered by the two-story, one-bay kitchen wing. A collapsed shed roofed porch is fixed to the east side of the kitchen. Six-over-six sash windows light both floors.

The interior was not seen.


