The Lewis Cummings house is located at the end of an oyster shell road off of the east side of Black Walnut Point Road on Tilghman Island, Talbot County, Maryland. The house faces west with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis.

The Cummings house is one of the earliest structures on Tilghman Island, dating to about 1856. The exterior of this two-story frame house is clad in cedar shake shingles. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles and the house is supported by a low brick pier foundation.

The west (main) facade of the house has three bays with a central door flanked by six-over-six sash windows with narrow surrounds. The door is sheltered by a gable roof portico supported by plain posts. The second story is lit by three six-over-six sash windows. Two one-story, gable roof additions telescope to the north from the main house.

The south elevation is blind with an interior brick chimney which pierces the roof of this gable end.

The east elevation has a full width screen porch on the first story. The first floor of the house is lit by two six-over-six sash windows and a central door. The second story is lit by three six-over-six sash windows. The east elevation of both the first and second additions has an entrance doors.

The north elevation of the main house is a blind gable end with an interior brick chimney which pierces the roof. A one-story, one room gable end addition telescopes out from the main body of the house and is lit by a three-over-three sash window on the west side, and a door on the east side. A second addition, built by the current owners, is a one-story, gable roofed structure which was built onto the north end of the first addition. Both additions are covered in cedar shake shingles and roofed with red, corrugated tin.

The interior of the house has been changed little over the years despite the additions and two rebuilt fireplaces. The exposed ceiling beams of the first floor room on the south end are particularly interesting. Measured indentations in these beams, which have nothing to do with their current use, suggest that they were salvaged from an earlier structure.

Larrimore Cummings purchased this five acre property, along with an additional 95 acres, from James M. Seth in 1846. Following his death in 1852, part of the Cummings estate was acquired by John V. Lowe. Lewis Cummings, Larrimore's son, bought this five acre plot from Lowe in 1856 and made it his home until 1894. It is unclear whether a house existed on this five acre plot when Lewis purchased it in 1856 although one of his children claims to have been born there in 1853. A house is clearly represented on this site in the 1858 map of Talbot County.

According to local lore, a house had existed on this site since the War of 1812. Sailing vessels used to come ashore on the property and take fresh water from the artesian well which flowed there. A January 6, 1947 Star Democrat article entitled "Mrs. L.A. Fluhart of Tilghman Dies at 93," concerns Lewis Cummings' daughter and her memories of the house and its history. Mrs. Fluhart claimed she was born in the Cummings house on May 10, 1853 and lived there until 1873 when she married Lewis Fluhart. She remembered a slave settlement near their home and Union troops camping on the Cummings property during the Civil War.

The Cummings house remains isolated from neighboring buildings, and sits less than ten feet from the edge of Black Walnut, or Barney's Cove. Its situation is typical of the few homes that were scattered over Tilghman's Island in the maps of the 1840s and 1850s.
