The Dashields-Delahay house follows a common architecture form for Oxford's late nineteenth-century dwellings. The two-story, three-bay frame house is covered by a medium pitched hip roof and the first floor front is sheltered by a turned post porch. The entrance features a transom and sidelights which border a molded Victorian door. What is not clearly evident from a casual inspection of the house is the significant reorientation of the first floor fenestration that occurred during the mid twentieth century. The original entrance, located in the northern of the three-bay facade, was relocated to its present position, and the former door was converted to a window. Inside the side hall partition was removed with the hall and parlor consolidated into one large room. The staircase was subsequently rebuilt in the northwest corner with access through the dining room. An exterior brick chimney was built against the north wall to serve a fireplace in the enlarged parlor.

Construction of the house is estimated to date during the mid to late 1880s after a large number of lots were created and subsequently divided between Charles F. and Thomas B. Stewart in 1883. The lot on which this house is located was assigned to Thomas B. Stewart and is numbered #5 on the plat created for the partition. Although a deed transferring the lot from Stewart hands was not found, a house of this size and configuration is designated on the Sanborn Insurance map of Oxford drawn in 1891. In 1897 the property was transferred between William W. Dashields and Rebecca E. Dashields, both residents of Baltimore City. The property remained in Rebecca's name

until 1915 when she sold the house and lot to Jesse A. Delahay, in whose family the residence remained until the present owners purchased it in 1981.

The Dashiels-Delahay house is located at 226 South Morris Street in the southern residential district of Oxford, Talbot County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame house faces east with the hip roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Dating around 1885-90, the two-story, three-bay by two-bay frame house is supported on a continuous brick foundation and the exterior is clad with vinyl siding. The medium pitched hip roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story service wing.

The east (main) elevation is a three-bay facade that has been rearranged during the twentieth century. The original front entrance formerly occupied the northern bay of the three-bay facade and was relocated to the south bay when the hall partition was removed when the side passage and parlor were consolidated into one space. The original entrance was repositioned in the southern bay. A four-panel front door is framed by two-light sidelights and it is topped by a three-light transom. Two-over-two sash windows occupy the two adjacent bays, which are also trimmed with louvered shutters. The entire first floor is sheltered by a single story hip roofed porch supported on turned posts. Decorative Victorian style brackets have been added to each post. The second floor is lighted by three slightly uneven two-over-two sash windows.

The north side is dominated by an exterior brick chimney stack that was built around 1940 when the floor plan was rearranged. The south side is defined by a single-story bay window in the southwest bay. Otherwise, two-over-two sash windows light the first and second floors, and each opening is flanked by a pair of louvered shutters. The rear wall is largely covered by the two-story kitchen wing, which is extended on its south side by a shed roofed addition.

Due to the 1940s remodeling the interior reflects a mixture of late nineteenth-century and mid twentieth-century design. A double door opening separates the front parlor of living room from the rear dining room. The staircase was relocated to the northwest corner and is largely enclosed. A Victorian era mantel survives in the dining room. A layer of oak has been laid over the original floors. There is a seam in the flooring between the dining room and the bay window indicating the bay was a later addition, which is corroborated by the Sanborn Insurance maps.






