The Jim Jarman house is located on the east side of Rich Neck Road, in Claiborne, Talbot County, Maryland. The house faces west with the principle gable oriented on an east/west axis.

The Jarman house, built around 1900, is a frame, two-and-a-half story structure now sheathed in white asbestos siding. The roof is covered with semi-circular asphalt shingles. This structure is supported by a brick foundation.

The west (main) elevation is a three bay gable end with a central four-panel door. This door is flanked on either side by one eight-over-eight sash window with narrow surrounds. The second story is lit by two eight-over-eight sash windows with narrow surrounds. The gable is finished with a simple bargeboard and is lit by one eight-over-eight sash window. A raised platform porch with square posts and a baluster stretches across the first floor of the house.

The north elevation has one forty-two pane rectangular window as the western most bay. A set of two eight-over-eight sash windows light the eastern end of the first story. Two eight-over-eight sash windows light the second story and exposed rafter ends are apparent under the roof overhang. Two interior brick chimneys rise out of the center line of the roof. A one story, glass enclosed breezeway extends from the main body of the house to the east where it connects with a one-and-a-half story gable roof garage. These were built around 1970. The northern gable end of this garage is lit by one eight-over-eight sash window on the first floor and one six-over-six sash window in the upper half story.

The east elevation of the garage is lit by one eight-over-eight sash window. The second floor of the main body of the house is lit by two eight-over-eight sash windows. This gable end is finished with a simple bargeboard and lit by one eight-over-eight sash window. Originally, an open back porch stretched across the first story of this elevation.

The south elevation has three eight-over-eight sash windows across the first floor, and two eight-over-eight sash windows across the second floor. The south face of the garage has one large garage door and one modern door. The upper half story of this gable end garage is lit by one six-

Georgiana Tunis, wife of John H. Tunis, sold this property to John Cockey in 1876. Cockey then sold the property to Elijah J. Jarman in 1899. E.J. or "Jim" Jarman first came to Claiborne as the yard master for the B. C. & A. Railroad. Initially, he and his family stayed in a layover hotel known as "the Railroad House" which provided temporary lodging for railroad workers in Claiborne. Jarman built this house by 1902 when it appears on the 1902 USGS map of Maryland and on the 1912 Plat of Claiborne.

A chain of title reflects the corresponding changes in the Jarman name. E.J."J'Arman", perhaps the original spelling of the "Jarman" name, is used on the 1912 Plat although "Jarman" is used in the 1899 deed. By 1947 the spelling had changed to "Jarmon."

In addition to his work on the railroad, E.J. Jarman was a farmer and worked for many years as the manager at Rich Neck Farm. Originally, a large barn and smaller outbuilding stood on his property to the rear of the house. In old photographs it is clear that these buildings were already in a state of disrepair by the early 1920s.

Jim Jarman's son, Walter Jarman, became an engineer on the railroad. As an engineer, Walter spent much time going back and forth between Claiborne and Ocean City. Eventually, he and his wife Lottie purchased a boarding house in Ocean City and later a restaurant. Walter purchased the Jarman house when his father died and used it as a rental property. Finally, when Walter died, his wife Lottie moved to Claiborne permanently.

Lottie Jarman is well known in the Claiborne community for her love of music. As a young wife she would take the ferry to Baltimore for music


over-six sash window. Before the garage was built, a porch, like that on the front of the house, stretched across the first floor of the south elevation.
