Tentatively scheduled for demolition, this building is one of the finest examples of late nineteenth century, center city, upper income, domestic architecture in Hagerstown. Built on a high foundation with two and a half stories and a high roof, the house is a Romanesque style structure with Queen Anne elements. The building is an important element in the streetscape, offering whimsical relief from the staid lines of the neighboring structures.

The house was erected about 1894 as the residence of Abraham E. Albert, a businessman and banker. Albert purchased the property in 1893 and retained it until 1920 when it was sold to Fred E. Kraiss, a Hagerstown funeral director. The Kraiss family owned the house until the present owner, the YMCA, acquired it in 1961. The land upon which the house stands is the northern half of Lot No. 40 as delineated on the original plat of the city.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Albert-Kraiss House stands at 139 North Potomac Street in Hagerstown, Washington County, and is located on the west side of the street in the northern fourth of the block formed by Franklin and Church Streets, the second block north of Public Square.

The building is a circa 1894, center city, upper income, Romanesque style house with Queen Anne elements. Rectangular in shape, the structure is built on a high foundation abutting the sidewalk and has two and a half stories with a steeply pitched mansard roof along the south and east elevations. The building appears to be structurally sound. The exterior is nearly in original condition. The side exterior walls are painted and laid in Common bond (six to one). The facade is unpainted and laid in Stretcher bond.

The facade is irregular in massing and has a second story projecting bow window which rises into the top story as a conical peaked tower. The bow window has a flower-like corbel base. The facade windows have double-hung, wooden sashes with one-over-one lights and round arches with brick voussoirs. There are three windows on the two levels of the tower, two large windows below the corbel base, and a single window in the doorway. A rectangular window dormer with a gable roof is on the top floor above the door.

The facade foundation wall is constructed of rock-faced rectangular stone and rises up to the sills of the first floor windows. The foundation wall is capped with a Classical caretto molding. A stone belt course with low relief dentils simulating a shallow cornice separates the first and second floors. A band of decorative brickwork (raised diamond shapes) runs below the belt course. A dentiled, wooden cornice with architrave and cyma recta molding runs along the south and east elevations.

The facade doorway has a round arch with brick voussoirs and a rock-faced keystone. Below the round transom is a pair of glazed wooden doors with metal tracery. A later metal marquise supported by two chains hangs over the entrance. The doors are recessed slightly and are reached by a steep step of stone steps.

The mansard roof is concaved with Gothic crockets. It is covered with slate shingles with decorative pattern banding. Two rectangular window gables are located along the south elevation to the west of a brick chimney with decorative brickwork. The dormer roofs are also concave shaped. A ball finial sitting on a high square base is located in the northeast corner at the base of the roof.

A two and a half story round tower projects from the southwest corner of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The house was erected about 1894 as the residence of Abraham E. Albert (1858-1934), a businessman and banker. Albert purchased the property in 1893 (Deed Book 101, p. 343) and retained it until 1920 when it was sold to Fred W. Kraiss, a Hagerstown funeral director (Deed Book 159, p. 384). The Kraiss family owned the house until the present owner, the YMCA, acquired it in 1961. The land upon which the house stands is the northern half of Lot No. 40 as delineated on the original plat of the city.

Abraham Albert was a shoemaker in early years with shoemaking shops on South Potomac Street and Public Square before opening a retail shoe business. Between 1892 and 1895, he operated a wholesale liquor business in Hagerstown. A Republican, Albert was elected a County Commissioner in 1899 and served as President for two years. He was also director of several local companies (Williams, II, 1054-1055).

Kraiss was issued a permit for erecting a 5' x 8' "copper clad marquise" in 1929 (Building Inspector's Office).

Now vacant, the house was used in recent years as a Mormon Temple. It is scheduled for demolition for future expansion of "Y" facilities.

NOTE: William Morgan noted in his report (1970) the similarity of the building to those designed by Wilson Eyre, the Philadelphia architect.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

139 North Potomac Street is presently a Mormon temple, however, it was probably built as a private residence, or maybe for offices, etc. Built on a high stone base, 139 is a 3 storey brick house with the top storey actually part of a mansard roof. The most conspicuous feature of the house is the projecting bow window-tower that appears to grow out of the wall just below the second storey (it has a flower-like corbel base seemingly supporting it) and continues up through the mansard roof (where it is still red brick), culminating in a banded, slate conical peak. The front facade windows have rounded heads with brick voussoirs and fairly simple cornices between first and second storeys, at main roof level, and at the base of the tower peak. A later metal marquee hangs suspended over the entrance, making the recessed entrance vestibule seem even deeper.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Not unlike the almost fanciful urban houses of the Philadelphia architect, Wilson Eyre, 139 North Potomac Street is a late Romanesque Revival style house with Queen Anne elements. A definite addition to the streetscape of this section of North Potomac, 139's tower echoes that on the Firehouse further down the block [105 North Potomac] and acts as a foil for the slightly set back and large Colonial Revival YMCA next door.


