Describe present and historic physical appearance.

DESCRIPTION SUMMARY:

Begun in 1909, Trinity Lutheran Church is a rock-faced limestone structure with a steeply pitched slate roof in the English Gothic style. It has cast stone trim. Windows and doors have pointed gothic arches. The facade is dominated by a large square corner bell tower, with a crenelated top. Other embellishments include turrets, horizontal banding, and projecting gables. A three story brick educational wing is attached to the rear of the building along the alley. In its present configuration, it dates from 1960.

This church is listed in the National Register as part of the Hagerstown Historic District.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY:

Origin:

The Lutheran Church was founded in Germany during the reformation in the 16th Century. Martin Luther, an Augustinian Monk, was deeply concerned with the moral and financial abuses of the Catholic Church. The followers of Martin Luther became known as Lutherans. The Germans who emigrated to America in the 17th and 18th Centuries brought their religions with them, and soon established Lutheran Congregations. Many of the early German immigrants settled in Pennsylvania but gradually travelled into Maryland.

Beliefs:

The Lutheran Church believes that Jesus Christ died and rose from the dead to redeem all creatures and bring them to everlasting life in his Kingdom when he returns as Lord. Christ is the final revelation of the Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, as witnessed by the word of God, the Bible.

The Lutheran Church is an apostolic church, tracing the ordained ministry's heritage to the disciples of Jesus. A confessional church, basing faith on the rule and norm of the Scripture as explicated under the doctrine of Justification by Faith apart from works of the Law first revealed by St. Paul and later developed by Martin Luther. The Lutheran Church is a historical church, promulgating and proclaiming the Gospel through preaching, the sacraments, and works of love for our neighbors.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is working to restore the catholicity of the body of Christ through dialogues with other Christian denominations: Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, The Episcopal, The Greek Orthodox, The Reformed Church in America, The Catholic Church, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the United Church of Christ.

Ties to Religious History of This Region:

The first Lutherans to settle in Maryland in 1645 were Swedes who came to what is now Cecil County, but the settlement eventually vanished.

The first permanent settlement of Lutherans was made in 1722 in Monacacy (located about 10 miles north of where Frederick would be in 1745). The settlers were German immigrants from Lancaster, PA. They brought with them their Bibles, Hymn books, and devotional books, such as Luther's Catechism. Soon a community of Lutherans had formed, and they began to worship together. John C. Stover, a Lutheran Missionary, came to the Monacacy settlement in 1733 to baptize the children and organize to community into a congregation.

The earliest settlement of Lutherans in what is now Washington County began 30 miles west of the Monacacy settlement on the Conococheague. Its settlers were also German immigrants from Lancaster, PA. The Conococheague congregation began as a union organization of St. Paul's, known as "The Lutheran and Reformed Congregations on the west side of the Conococheague Bridge." In 1769, seven years after Hagerstown was founded, a Lutheran church was organized, and grew rapidly. As had happened with the Monacacy Congregation, the Conococheague Congregation was overshadowed by St. John's of Hagerstown. In 1772, this congregation became linked with St. John's and was served by the same pastor until 1823.

Historical Figures Associated with the Church:

Martin Luther, born at Elislebem Germany, in 1483, entered the Augustinian cloister in Erfurt in 1517 and became a monk. Through his teaching and writings, he hoped to reform the Catholic Church. However his stand shattered medieval Catholicism and initiated Protestantism. Those protestants who became his followers called themselves Lutherans.

History of Construction:

The Church council met on November 9, 1908 to discuss the plans to build a new church, or to remodel the existening one. Trinity Lutheran Church was dedicated on Sunday, March 19, 1911, two years after the groundbreaking ceremony held on June 14, 1909. The cornerstone was laid on October 10, 1909. The building was designed by A. N. Richter from Lebanan, PA. In 1960, the Sunday school portion of the complex was renovated and expanded. The architect for this project was T. Norman Mansell. Trinity was originally part of St. John's, but because of disagreements over enlarging and remodeling St. John's Church, in 1866, the congregation was split and Trinity was formed.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Trinity Lutheran Church is a large stone church built on a cruciform plan and having a corner tower at the 'west' end of the bulidng. Actually, the church is part of a complex of church-related buildings, there being parish house-church hall structures attached on both North Potomac Street and Randolph Avenue sides. A late Gothic Revival building, Trinity Lutheran has the chief characteristics of the 'Modern Gothic' Style: academic correctness coupled with a certain dryness, and a basically late English Gothic inspiration. The latter represented by the large 'west' window and the Perpendicular, spireless corner tower; the window tracery is also late Gothic. The windows, corner buttressing, light window trim, and other constructional highlights comprise the chief decoration, as much of its effect is achieved by the massing and outline [note the gargoyles on the corners of the tower].

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Although not an outstanding example, Trinity Lutheran Church is a good representative example of the late Gothic Revival style, often called 'Modern Gothic'. It has that style's basic characteristics, not the least of which is the picturesque quality evoked by the English tower with its gargoyles. A very strong corner building in the streetscape, Trinity echoes the tower of Zion Evangelical Church one block down the street (and built the same year as the church that Trinity replaced).
